

1 Introduction

1.1 This statistical bulletin presents national level information on activity relating to community penalties in Scotland, derived from Local Authority Social Work management information systems. It provides information on various aspects of criminal justice social work such as Social Enquiry Reports (SERs), Community Service Orders (CSOs) and Probation Orders (POs). It should be noted that individuals could be subject to several different reports and/or orders during 2008-09.

1.2 The number of SERs, CSOs and POs have increased gradually over the past three years (Chart 1). The number of Supervised Attendance Orders (SAOs) increased between 2006-07 and 2007-08 but decreased in 2008-09. Compared to other orders there are few Drug Treatment and Testing Orders (DTTOs), but their numbers have increased substantially between 2007-08 and 2008-09.

2 Key Points for 2008-09

Social Enquiry Reports (SERs)

• A total of 42,500 SERs which included supplementary reports were submitted by Local Authorities to the Courts in 2008-09, up 1 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 42,000 (Table 1).

• A total of 36,300 SERs (excluding supplementary reports) were submitted to the Courts in 2008-09, an increase of 1 per cent from 35,900 in 2007-08 (Table 5).

Community Service Orders (CSOs)

• A total of 6,400 CSOs (excluding Probation Orders with a Requirement of Unpaid Work) were made in 2008-09, a 4 per cent increase on the 2007-08 figure of 6,200 (Table 1).

• The number of CSOs (excluding Probation Orders with a Requirement of Unpaid Work) which were successfully completed increased by 16 per cent from 3,800 in 2007-08 to 4,400 in 2008-09. Terminations of CSOs overall (including successful completions) also increased by 16 per cent from 5,800 in 2007-08 to 6,700 in 2008-09.

• There were 2,113 breach applications made to the Courts in respect of CSOs (excluding Probation Orders with a Requirement of Unpaid Work) in 2008-09, a decrease of 2 per cent compared with the 2,161 breach applications in 2007-08.

Probation Orders (POs) including those with a requirement of unpaid work

• A total of 9,100 POs were made in 2008-09, an increase of 4 per cent compared to the level of 8,700 in 2007-08.

• The majority (57 per cent) of terminations of POs were orders which were successfully completed. The number of terminations overall (including successful completions) increased from 6,800 in 2007-08 to 7,400 in 2008-09, an increase of 8 per cent.

• There were 4,100 breach applications made to the Courts in respect of POs in 2008-09, a 19 per cent increase compared to the total of 3,400 in 2007-08.

POs with a Requirement of Unpaid Work

• A total of 3,300 POs with a Requirement of Unpaid Work were made in 2008-09, representing a 9 per cent increase from the 2007-08 total of 3,100.

• There were 1,600 breach applications made to the Courts in respect of POs with a Requirement of Unpaid Work in 2008-09, an increase of 36 per cent on the 1,200 applications in 2007-08.

Supervised Attendance Orders (SAOs)

• A total of 4,300 SAOs were made in 2008-09, down 3 per cent from the total of 4,400 in 2007-08.

• Of 3,900 SAOs which were terminated in 2008-09, 2,400 (61 per cent) of these were orders which were successfully completed. The total number of terminations of

SAOs increased by 33 per cent on the 2007-08 level of 3,000. There were 2,200 breach applications made to the Courts in respect of SAOs in 2008-09, an increase of 68 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 1,300.

Drug Treatment and Testing Orders (DTTOs)

• A total of 752 DTTOs were made in 2008-09, up 25 per cent from 601 in 2007-08.

• Forty per cent of DTTO terminations were due to successful completion. The total number of terminations of DTTOs increased by 10 per cent from 491 in 2007-08 to 542 in 2008-09. In 2008-09 there were 218 breach applications of DTTOs, an increase of 4 per cent on the 2007-08 figure of 209 breaches.

Statutory Throughcare

• In 2008-09, a total of 1,236 Throughcare (in the community) cases commenced, an increase of 17 per cent from the 1,056 cases which commenced in 2007-08. A further 1,109 Throughcare (in custody) cases commenced, a decrease of 11 per cent from the 1,247 cases which commenced in 2007-08.

Voluntary Assistance (VA) and the Throughcare Addiction Service (TAS)

• In 2008-09 there were a total of 2,440 individuals receiving VA and a total of 2,905 VA cases commenced. Of the VA cases commenced in 2008-09, 1,455 related to the TAS.

Home Circumstances Reports (HCRs)

• A total of 1,593 HCRs excluding home leave reports were reported in 2008-09, an increase of 15 per cent on the 2007-08 figure of 1,386. Including home leave reports, 2,900 HCRs were reported in 2008-09.

Diversion from Prosecution (DPs)

• A total of 962 DP cases commenced in 2008-09, an increase of less than 1 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 956 cases.

Bail Information

• During 2008-09, 8,900 requests were made by Courts to local authorities for bail information, an increase of 11 per cent since 2007-08 (Table 32). A total of 583 bail supervision cases commenced in the year, relating to 496 individuals (Table 1).

Court Services

• A total of 2,100 stand down reports were provided to the Courts in 2008-09 and 16,500 post sentence interviews were carried out (Table 33).

3 Social Enquiry Reports (SERs)

(Tables 1 to 8, Chart 2)

3.1 A total of 42,500 SERs were submitted in 2008-09 by Local Authorities to the Courts (excluding letters sent in lieu of reports). This is an increase of 1 per cent from the 42,000 submitted in 2007-08. Also in 2008-09, a total of 51,000 SERs were requested by the Courts, an increase of 2 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 50,100 (Table 1).

SERs, excluding Supplementary Reports

3.2 A total of 36,300 SERs (excluding Supplementary Reports) were submitted to the Courts in 2008-09, a small increase of 1 per cent compared to the 2007-08 total of 35,900 (Table 5). The majority (84 per cent) of these reports in 2008-09 were made in respect of males (Table 6).

3.3 SERs were most common amongst young adults, accounting for 322 per 10,000 population of 18 to 20 year olds (Table 2). The incidence of SERs was also relatively common amongst 16 to 17 year olds (242 per 10,000 population) and 21 to 25 year olds (219 per 10,000 population). These figures were substantially higher for males (Chart 2), with the highest for males aged 18 to 20 (558 per 10,000 population). It should be noted that one person can be the subject of more than one SER within a year.




Chart 2 Number of SERs, 2006-07 to 2008-09

3.4 Males who were the subject of SERs tended to be younger than females, with 28 per cent of reports for males and 19 per cent of those for females relating to under 21 year olds (Chart 2 and Table 2).

3.5 The majority of SERs related to the unemployed (55 per cent) with only 3 per cent of SERs being for people in full time education or on a government sponsored training scheme (Table 3).

SERs and Preferred Options

3.6 One of the main purposes of a SER is to offer information and advice which can help the court decide between the available sentencing options. The National Objectives and Standards for Social Work Services in the Criminal Justice System state that: *"Whilst reports must not include a recommendation as such, report writers may indicate, on the basis of their review and assessment, which non-custodial option is in their opinion most likely to prevent or reduce future offending in the event of the court deciding it not necessary to impose a custodial sentence. ... If the offender has been assessed as someone who could pose a risk of serious harm to others, the court will appreciate advice on the desirability of a Supervised Release Order or Extended Sentence in the event of custody."*

3.7 Fifteen per cent of SERs in 2008-09 gave no preferred sentencing option, a decrease from 17 per cent in 2007-08 (Table 6). Probation was the preferred option in 24 per cent of SERs, just under half being with standard conditions. Fifteen per cent of reports gave Community Service as the preferred option which tended to be more common for males (16 per cent) than for females (11 per cent). Fifteen per cent gave a deferred sentence of 3 months or more as the preferred option and 8 per cent of SERs suggested a monetary penalty. Custody was rarely suggested, featuring as the preferred option in just under 4 per cent of reports. Around 18 per cent of reports suggested some other form of preferred option (including a Restriction of Liberty Order (RLO) or a deferment for a Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO) assessment).

3.8 The main outcome (Table 7) in 22 per cent of SERs was Probation, closely followed by Community Service (15 per cent) and Custody (14 per cent). Other main outcomes were Monetary Penalty and Deferred Sentence (both 9 per cent).

3.9 Males were more likely to receive Custody (17 per cent) or Community Service (15 per cent) than females (7 and 12 per cent respectively). On the contrary, Probation with Standard Conditions was more common amongst female offenders, accounting for 11 per cent of SERs for females and 7 per cent for males.

3.10 Outcomes and preferred options can be grouped into 4 broad categories (Table 8): Custodial Sentence, Community Sentence (Probation, Community Service, Restriction of Liberty Orders and Deferments for DTTO Assessments), Monetary Penalty and Other/not known (covering all other preferred options and outcomes). Using this grouping (excluding Glasgow City for which this was not available), the main outcome corresponded to the preferred option in 44 per cent of all SERs. For SERs where the preferred option was a Custodial Sentence, the main outcome was a Custodial Sentence in 73 per cent of cases for males and 54 per cent for females. Community Sentences were the main outcome in 58 per cent of SERs for males and

60 per cent of reports for females where a Community Sentence was the preferred option.

4 Community Service Orders (CSOs)

(Tables 1 to 4 & 9 to 10, Chart 3) CSOs excluding Probation Orders with a Requirement of Unpaid Work

4.1 A total of 6,400 CSOs (excluding Probation Orders with a Requirement of Unpaid Work) were made in 2008-09 (Table 1). This represents an increase of 4 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 6,200.

4.2 Male offenders accounted for 88 per cent of CSOs (excluding Probation Orders with a Requirement of Unpaid Work) as shown in Table 2.

4.3 CSOs (excluding Probation Orders with a Requirement of Unpaid Work) were relatively more common amongst young offenders, with 61 and 45 orders per 10,000 population for 18-20 and 21-25 year olds respectively (Table 2). Females receiving CSOs tended to be older, with 62 per cent of such orders relating to over 25 year olds. The corresponding proportion for males was 49 per cent.

4.4 The employment status of offenders provides an indication of whether the offender is likely to be available for work during normal working hours (i.e. weekdays between 9am and 5pm). Fifty-four per cent of CSOs were given to offenders who were either unemployed or not seeking employment. Thirty-seven per cent were employed or self employed, in full time education or on a government sponsored training scheme (Table 3).

Breach Applications of CSOs

4.5 There were 2,113 breach applications made to the Courts in 2008-09 in respect of CSOs. This represented a decrease of 2 per cent compared with the 2,161 breach applications in 2007-08 (Table 1 and Chart 3).

4.6 The number of breach applications is not directly comparable with the number of orders provided previously (which covers new orders only) as some of the breach applications may relate to orders started in the previous year. However, in 2008-09 there was a requirement that CSOs had to be completed within a 12 month period, and the number of orders started in 2008-09 (6,400 excluding Probation with Unpaid Work) can be taken as a proxy measure for the number of orders active during the year. This suggests that around a third of orders resulted in a breach application.

4.7 Around 17 per cent of breach applications resulted in the original order being revoked and a custodial sentence imposed, which is similar to 2007-08 (Table 9). A further 25 per cent of breaches resulted in the original order being revoked and some other action taken (including order revoked and probation imposed and order revoked and monetary penalty imposed). In 13 per cent of applications, the original order was continued and no further action taken by the court and in 3 per cent of applications, a warrant for apprehension/recall was made. The outcome was not yet known for 24 per cent of breach applications made in 2008-09, a decrease from 34 per cent in 2006-07.




Chart 3 Breaches and terminations of CSOs, 2006-07 to 2008-09

4.8 Males accounted for 89 per cent of breach applications. As males also accounted for a similar proportion of all new orders (see paragraph 4.2), this suggests that breach applications are as likely to occur for males as for females.

4.9 An outcome of revoked and custody was more common amongst males (18 per cent) than females (10 per cent) as shown in Table 9. The outcome of order revoked and probation was a more likely outcome for females (9 per cent) than for males (5 per cent).

Terminations of Community Service Orders

4.10 A total of 6,700 CSOs were terminated in 2008-09, an increase of 16 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 5,800 (Table 1 and Chart 3). Approximately 65 per cent of these orders were successfully completed (Table 10), 4 per cent were revoked following a review, 22 per cent of orders were revoked following a breach application to the courts and the remainder were terminated for other reasons (including transfer to another area and death of the offender).

4.11 Females (66 per cent) were slightly more likely to complete their orders successfully than males (64 per cent).

5 Probation Orders (POs)

(Tables 1 to 4 & 11 to 13, Chart 4)

5.1 A total of 9,100 POs (including POs with a Requirement of Unpaid Work) were made in 2008-09 (Table 1). This is an increase of 4 per cent compared to the level of orders in 2007-08.

5.2 Male offenders accounted for 82 per cent of POs as shown in Table 2.

5.3 The incidence of POs was highest amongst 18 to 20 year olds (79 per 10,000 population) and was also relatively common amongst 16 to 17 year olds (70 per 10,000 population) and 21 to 25 year olds (51 per 10,000 population).

5.4 Males receiving Probation tended to be younger than females, with 29 per cent of POs for males and 21 per cent of those for females being given to offenders aged under 21 years.

5.5 As with Community Service, the employment status of offenders provides an indication of the availability of offenders (see paragraph 4.4). Two-thirds of POs were for offenders who were unemployed or not seeking employment. A further 23 per cent of POs were for offenders in full-time employment, self employed, in full time education or on a government sponsored training scheme (Table 3).

5.6 Around 36 per cent of all POs had standard conditions only (Table 11). A Requirement of Unpaid Work was made in 31 per cent of Orders, while 14 per cent included conditions of Alcohol Treatment/Education or Drug Treatment/Education. POs with a condition of attendance on a domestic abuse programme has fluctuated from 2 per cent in 2006-07 to 1 per cent in 2007-08 and then 3 per cent in 2008-09. The number of POs with a condition of attendance on a sex offender programme has seen a small increase (63 cases in 2007-08 and 101 in 2008-09).

5.7 Probation Orders with standard conditions only were more likely to be imposed on females (49 per cent) than males (34 per cent). A Requirement of Unpaid Work was more common amongst males (33 per cent) than females (23 per cent).

Breach Applications of POs

5.8 There were 4,100 breach applications made to the Courts in 2008-09 in respect of POs, an increase of 19 per cent compared to the 2007-08 total of 3,400 applications (Table 1 and Chart 4). Males accounted for 82 per cent of breach applications (Table 12).

5.9 The number of breach applications is not directly comparable with the number of orders provided previously (which covers new orders only) as some of the breach applications may relate to orders started in previous years.

5.10 Around 18 per cent of breach applications resulted in the original order being revoked and a custodial sentence imposed, 12 per cent resulted in the order being revoked and a new probation order imposed, 2 per cent in the order being revoked and a community service order being imposed and 9 per cent in the original order being revoked and some other action taken (including a monetary penalty). In 20 per

cent of applications, the original order was continued and no further action taken by the court. The outcome was not yet known in 25 per cent of applications.




Chart 4 Breaches and terminations of POs, 2006-07 to 2008-09

Terminations of POs

5.11 A total of 7,400 POs were terminated in 2008-09, an increase of 8 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 6,800 (Table 1 and Chart 4). Fifty-seven per cent of these orders were successfully completed (including early discharge following a review). Twenty-nine per cent were terminated following a breach application (Table 13). The remaining 14 per cent of orders were terminated for other reasons (including transfer to another area and death of the offender).

5.12 Females (59 per cent) were slightly more likely to complete orders successfully (including early discharge following a review) than males (57 per cent). A greater proportion of orders were terminated following a breach for males (30 per cent) than females (26 per cent).

6 Probation Orders (POs) with a Requirement of Unpaid Work

(Tables 1 & 14 to 16, Chart 5)

6.1 These orders represent a subset of the data on all Probation Orders. A total of 3,300 POs with a Requirement of Unpaid Work were made in 2008-09 (Table 1). This is an increase of 9 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 3,100 orders.

6.2 Male offenders accounted for 88 per cent of Probation Orders with a Requirement of Unpaid Work (Table 14). For all persons, the incidence of POs was highest amongst 18 to 20 year olds (35 per 10,000 population) and was also

relatively common amongst 16 to 17 year olds (25 per 10,000 population) and 21 to 25 year olds (22 per 10,000 population).

6.3 Females receiving these orders tended to be older than males. Thirty-two per cent of males were aged 20 or under, compared to 25 per cent of females.

6.4 As discussed in paragraphs 4.4 and 5.5, the employment status of offenders provides an indication of their availability to undertake unpaid work. Two-thirds of POs with a Requirement of Unpaid Work were for offenders who were unemployed or not seeking employment (Table 15). This proportion was higher for females (75 per cent) than males (65 per cent).

Breach Applications of POs with a Requirement of Unpaid Work

6.5 There were around 1,600 breach applications made to the Courts in 2008-09 in respect of POs with a Requirement of Unpaid Work, an increase of 36 per cent compared to the 2007-08 total of 1,200 applications (Table 1). In 2008-09, the condition of unpaid work was breached in 699 (42 per cent) of these cases (Table 16). The outcome of breach applications has varied slightly between 2007-08 and 2008-09: there has not been such an increase in the number of orders being revoked and given custody, rather than revoked and another penalty (as shown by the first two pairs of bars in Chart 5).




Chart 5 Breach Outcomes for POs (Unpaid Work), 2006-07 to 2008-09

6.6 Males accounted for 88 per cent of breach applications (there were 611 males from a total of 699 as shown in Table 16).

6.7 Eighteen per cent of all breach applications resulted in the original order being revoked and custody being imposed, 13 per cent resulted in the order being revoked and a new probation order imposed, 2 per cent in the order being revoked and a

community service order being imposed and 7 per cent in the order being revoked and some other action taken (including a monetary penalty). In 18 per cent of applications, the original order was continued and no further action taken by the court. The outcome was not yet known in 28 per cent of applications.

7 Supervised Attendance Orders (SAOs)

(Tables 1 to 4 & 17 to 20, Chart 6)

7.1 A total of 4,300 SAOs were imposed on 3,600 individual offenders in 2008-09, a decrease of 3 per cent in the number of orders compared to 2007-08 (Table 1). Eighty-five per cent of SAOs were made in respect of males (Table 2).

7.2 The incidence of SAOs was highest amongst 21 to 25 year olds (25 per 10,000 population) followed by 31 to 40 year olds (24 per 10,000 population) and 26 to 30 year olds (19 per 10,000 population).

7.3 Females receiving SAOs tended to be older than males, with 68 per cent of orders for females and 57 per cent for males being given to offenders aged over 25 years. In addition, 17 per cent of orders for males and 11 per cent for females were made to offenders aged under 21 years.

7.4 Table 17 shows that Sheriff Courts imposed the largest number of SAOs (47 per cent of the total).

7.5 The majority (70 per cent) of SAOs were made to offenders who were unemployed or not seeking employment, up from 67 per cent in 2007-08 (Table 3).

Breach Applications of SAOs

7.6 There were 2,200 breach applications in respect of SAOs made to the Courts in 2008-09, 68 per cent more than in 2007-08 (Table 1 and Table 18). The number of individuals with breach applications was 1,800, an increase of 57 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 1,100.

7.7 The number of breach applications is not directly comparable with the number of orders provided previously (which covers new orders only) as some of the breach applications may relate to orders started in the previous year. However, as SAOs are expected to be completed within a 12 month period (and usually within 6 months), the number of orders started in 2007-08 (4,300) can be taken as a proxy measure for the number of orders active during the year. This suggests that one in two orders result in a breach application (Table 1).

7.8 Fifty-four per cent of breach applications were made to Sheriff Courts with a further 23 per cent to Stipendiary Magistrates and 23 per cent to the District Courts. The majority of breach applications (83 per cent) were made in respect of males (Table 18).

7.9 In 2008-09, 11 per cent of breach applications resulted in the original order being revoked and a custodial sentence being imposed (down from 13 per cent in 2007-08). A further 18 per cent were continued without further action (up from 15 per cent in 2007-08) and 9 per cent were continued with hours varied (up from 7 per cent

in 2007-08). The outcome was not yet known for 30 per cent of breach applications, up slightly from 2007-08 (Table 19).




Chart 6 Breaches and terminations of SAOs, 2006-07 to 2008-09

Terminations of SAOs

7.10 A total of 3,900 SAOs were terminated in 2008-09, an increase of 33 per cent from the previous year's total of 3,000 (Table 20 and Chart 6). The majority (61 per cent) were successfully completed, 5 per cent were revoked following a review, 29 per cent of orders were revoked following a breach application to the court and the remainder were terminated for other reasons (including transfer to another area and death of the offender).

8 Drug Treatment and Testing Orders (DTTOs)

(Tables 1 to 4 & 21 to 22, Chart 7)

8.1 The DTTO is now available to the High Court and all sheriff courts in Scotland. A total of 752 DTTOs were made in 2008-09, an increase of 25 per cent since 2007-08. In 2008-09, 1,700 DTTO Assessments were made, an increase of 21 per cent on the previous years total (Table 1 and Chart 7). The increase may partly be due to increased demand for DTTOs; a new model for DTTOs has been rolled out to at least one local authority and this can be issued from lower courts and for less serious offenders.

8.2 Male offenders accounted for 77 per cent of DTTOs (Table 2). The proportion of females aged over 40 receiving DTTOs increased from 1 per cent in 2006-07 to 6 per cent in 2007-08 and has remained at this level in 2008-09.

8.3 The incidence of DTTOs was highest amongst 26 to 30 year olds (8 per 10,000 population) and 21 to 25 year olds (4 per 10,000 population). 38 per cent of all females and 22 per cent of males receiving DTTOs were aged 25 or under.




Chart 7 DTTO Orders, individuals and assessments, 2006-07 to 2008-09

8.4 Eighty-eight per cent of DTTOs were imposed on unemployed offenders or those not seeking employment, a slight decrease of 1 per cent on 2007-08. 5 per cent of DTTOs were imposed on offenders employed, self employed, in full time education or on a government sponsored training scheme (Table 3).

Breach Applications of DTTOs

8.5 There were 218 breach applications made to Courts in 2008-09 in respect of DTTOs, an increase of 4 per cent from 209 in 2007-08 (Table 21). Males accounted for 70 per cent of these applications. The number of breach applications is not directly comparable with the number of orders previously provided (which covers new orders only) as some breach applications may relate to orders started in the previous year.

8.6 Around 37 per cent of breach applications resulted in the original order being revoked and a custodial sentence imposed, slightly higher than in 2007-08. Two per cent resulted in the order being revoked and a new DTTO imposed whilst a further 17 per cent resulted in the original order being revoked and some other action taken. In 5 per cent of applications, the DTTO was continued and varied. A further 12 per cent resulted in no further action taken by the court, a decrease from 15 per cent in 2007-08. A sixth of outcomes were not yet known.

Terminations of DTTOs

8.7 A total of 542 DTTOs were terminated in 2008-09, an increase of 10 per cent on the 491 terminations in 2007-08 (Table 22). Forty per cent were successfully completed, 15 per cent were revoked following a review and 36 per cent of orders were terminated following a breach application (up from 35 per cent in 2007-08). The remainder were terminated for other reasons (including transfer out of the area and death).

9 Statutory Throughcare (TC), Voluntary Assistance (VA) and Throughcare Addiction Service (TAS)

(Tables 1 & 23 to 29, Chart 8 & Chart 9)

9.1 A total of 5,400 individuals were subject to Statutory Throughcare (in the community and in custody) as at 31 March 2009, an increase of 1 per cent from the 5,300 such individuals the previous year (Table 1 and Table 23). Of these individuals, 43 per cent were being supervised in the community and 97 per cent were male.


9.2 1,236 Statutory Throughcare (TC) cases in the community commenced in 2008-09. This represents an increase of 17 per cent from the 1,056 cases which commenced in 2007-08 (Table 24). Several local authorities have acknowledged that there have been problems with recording this data in the past, and some authorities have had a change of system during the reporting period. Data quality continues to improve but any conclusions about trends over time should be treated with some caution. Almost all cases commenced were for males (95 per cent). A third were for Parole licences, 27 per cent for Non Parole licences, 16 per cent for Supervised Release Orders, 10 per cent for Extended Sentences, 4 per cent for Life licences, 5 per cent for short-term sex offenders and 5 per cent for other forms of supervision in the community (Chart 8).


9.3 There were 2,300 cases in the community currently being supervised, 96 per cent of which are for males (Table 25).

9.4 In 2008-09, 1,060 Throughcare (in the community) cases were completed, an increase of 21 per cent from 879 in 2007-08 (Table 26). Twenty-nine per cent related to Parole licences, 24 per cent to non-parole licences and 20 per cent to Supervised Release Orders. The remaining 26 per cent related to Extended Sentences, Life licences and other forms of community supervision.

9.5 Criminal Justice Social Work is expected to provide a throughcare service to all prisoners who are subject to statutory supervision post release. This service begins at the start of a prisoner's sentence and is managed via the Scottish Prison Service's Integrated Case Management process. 2005-06 was the first year in which information on Throughcare cases commenced in custody was collected. Previously the collection focused only on the number of individuals in custody as at 31 March. In 2008-09, 1,109 Throughcare (in custody) cases commenced (Table 27). Again, the majority were for males (97 per cent). 16 per cent were for Extended Sentences, 7 per cent were for Life licences, 17 per cent for Supervised Release Orders, 5 per

cent for short term sex offenders and 54 per cent for other determinate sentences of four years and over (Table 27 and Chart 9).



9.6 There were 3,000 cases in custody currently being supervised, 97 per cent of which were for males (Table 28).

9.7 Information on Voluntary Assistance (VA) was collected for the first time in 2004-05 and, from 2005-06 onwards, includes data on the new Throughcare Addiction Service (see paragraph 9.9). There were a total of 2,400 individuals receiving voluntary assistance in 2008-09 (Table 1 and Table 29). This represents an increase of 12 per cent compared to the 2,200 individuals receiving assistance in 2007-08.

9.8 In 2008-09, a total of 2,900 voluntary assistance cases commenced, an increase of 12 per cent on the previous year.

9.9 The Throughcare Addiction Service (TAS) commenced on 1 August 2005 and forms part of the voluntary aftercare service. Further information is available in the Annex at paragraph 13.19. Of the voluntary assistance cases commenced, around 1,500 related to the Throughcare Addiction Service (TAS). These 1,500 or so cases related to 1,269 individuals who received TAS in 2008-09. This was an increase of 190 individuals on the 2007-08 figure of 1,079 individuals.

10 Home Circumstance Reports (HCR)

(Tables 1 & 30)

10.1 A total of 1,593 HCRs for parole / non-parole (excluding home leave reports) were recorded in 2008-09, an increase of 15 per cent compared to the 2007-08 figure of 1,386 (Table 1 and Table 30). In addition, 1,261 home leave reports were recorded in 2008-09, a decrease of 4 per cent on the 2007-08 figure of 1,315. The majority (98 per cent) of all HCRs were for males.

11 Diversion from Prosecution (DPs)

(Tables 1 to 4 & 31, Chart 10)

11.1 A total of 962 DPs commenced in 2008-09, a slight increase of less than 1 per cent from the 2007-08 total of 956 (Table 1). These 962 cases relate to 929 individuals. Other DP totals for 2008-09 included 1,331 referrals (a 6 per cent increase on 2007-08), 1,236 assessments (12 per cent increase), 779 cases successfully completed (5 per cent decrease) and 43 cases referred to drug treatment/education (16 per cent decrease) (Table 31). Whilst at least one local authority has seen a greater use of DPs by the procurator fiscal, this has not been the case across all local authorities.

11.2 Approximately 49 per cent of DP cases commenced in 2008-09 involved males (Table 2 and Chart 10). Females receiving DPs tended to be older than males, with 59 per cent aged over 30 compared with 49 per cent for males. Conversely, 35 per cent of cases for males and 17 per cent for females involved persons aged under 21 years.

11.3 About 51 per cent of DP cases commenced in 2008-09 related to offenders who were unemployed or not seeking employment (Table 3).




Chart 10 DPs by Age and Gender of Offender, 2006-07 to 2008-09 Cases per 10,000 population

12 Bail Information and Court Services

(Tables 32 to 33)

12.1 During 2008-09, the Courts made 8,900 requests for bail information to local authorities, up 11 per cent from 8,000 in 2007-08. It has been observed by at least one local authority that this increase may be partly due to the increase in funding provided to Sacro which has allowed them to increase their capacity. The increase may also be due to a formalised bail supervision protocol which was set up between the council, court, police and procurator fiscal. A total of 583 bail supervision cases commenced in 2008-09, relating to a total of 496 individuals (Table 1 and Table 32). This reflects decreases of 20 and 25 per cent respectively on the 2007-08 figures of 729 cases and 657 individuals.

12.2 A total of 2,100 stand down reports were provided to the Courts in 2008-09. This represents a decrease of 8 per cent on the 2,300 provided in 2007-08 (Table 33).

12.3 There were 16,500 post sentence interviews carried out in 2008-09, an increase of 19 per cent from 13,800 in 2007-08. Approximately 84 per cent of the post sentence interviews carried out were for males.

ANNEX

Notes and Definitions

Background

13.1 Criminal justice social work services in Scotland are provided by local authorities throughout the country.

13.2 In 1991 the Scottish Office's Social Work Services Group published National Objectives and Standards for criminal justice social work services. These National Standards had been agreed in consultation with local authorities and all the key stakeholders of the criminal justice system. The National Standards set out a framework of objectives and standards for the delivery of criminal justice social work services and how non-compliance by offenders with orders of the court should be handled.

Community Justice Authorities (CJAs)

13.3 The Management of Offenders etc. (Scotland) Act 2005 established provisions for eight local CJAs. These authorities have been established to provide a coordinated approach to planning and monitoring the delivery of offender services by planning, managing performance and reporting on performance of local authorities or groups of local authorities and key partner agencies including the Scottish Prison Service (SPS). Their aim is to target services to reduce reoffending and to ensure close co-operation between community and prison services to aid the rehabilitation of offenders. Each CJA consists of a Chief Officer, elected members of local authorities and support staff to carry out the functions of the CJA. Tables in the form of datasets, at CJA and local authority area level, have been published on the Scottish Government website part of this publication as (http://www.scotland.gov.uk/Topics/Statistics/Browse/Crime-Justice/Datasets).

13.4 There are 8 CJAs and they contain the following Local Authority areas:

Social Enquiry Reports

13.5 The main purpose of a Social Enquiry Report (SER) is to provide information about the offender and their background circumstances, prior to sentencing, which helps the court decide how to deal with the case. Reports can be requested by the court for any case but must be requested before imposing a custodial sentence for the first time, or if the offender is under 21 years of age. A court must obtain a SER before making a community service or probation order.

13.6 In some cases, supplementary reports may be submitted to the court. These are shorter reports which provide supplementary information (in addition to that previously provided in a SER).

Community Service

13.7 A person 16 years of age or over and convicted of a crime or an offence can be given a Community Service Order (CSO) to carry out unpaid work in the community. CSOs can only be made by courts as an alternative to a custodial sentence. The court must also be satisfied that four conditions are met:

- the offender must agree to the CSO;
- community service must be available in the area where the offender lives;
- the offender is suitable for community service;
- suitable work is available.

13.8 Community Service Orders are for a minimum of 80 hours up to a maximum of 240 hours under summary procedure and 300 hours under solemn procedure. They must be completed within 12 months.

Probation

13.9 Probation Orders provide one of the opportunities for criminal justice social work services to focus on offending behaviour. Prior consent of the offender is required, and the order should be informed by an Action Plan in which the offender agrees to address their offending behaviour and its underlying causes. Probation Orders can be used very flexibly by the courts and additional conditions can be attached regarding the offender undertaking unpaid work, their place of residence, curfew (including electronic monitoring), financial recompense to the victim or attendance at a specialist programme such as alcohol or drug treatment. The minimum length of a Probation Order is 6 months and the maximum is 3 years.

Supervised Attendance

13.10 Supervised Attendance Orders require an offender who has failed to pay a fine to undertake a programme of designated activities for a specified number of hours. The programme can involve:

- activities of an educational nature;
- activities designed to stimulate interest and encourage the constructive use of time;

• activities involving unpaid work in the community.

13.11 Supervised Attendance Orders run for between 10 and 100 hours (subject to a limit of 50 hours where the outstanding amount is up to £200) as ordered by the court.

Drug Treatment and Testing

13.12 The Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO) is a high tariff disposal for drug mis-using offenders who might otherwise receive a custodial sentence, and is available to the High Court, Sheriff Court and Glasgow Stipendiary Magistrates Court. The Order contains features unique to a community disposal, including a requirement for regular reviews by the court and a requirement that the offender consent to frequent random drug tests throughout the lifetime of the Order.

13.13 DTTOs were rolled out across Scotland in phases. Between 1999 and 2002 the Order was rolled out to Glasgow, Fife and Aberdeen. In 2002-03 the Order became available in Edinburgh, Renfrewshire/Inverclyde and Tayside. At present the Order is now available to the High Court and all Sheriff courts in Scotland.

Restriction of Liberty

13.14 Restriction of Liberty Orders have been available to High, Sheriff and Stipendiary Courts in Scotland since May 2002. A Restriction of Liberty Order can be imposed for periods of up to one year, and involves restricting an individual to a specified place for up to 12 hours per day and/or from a specified place for up to 24 hours.

13.15 The number of Restriction of Liberty Orders imposed can be sourced from the Criminal Proceedings in Scottish Courts Statistical Bulletin (http://www.scotland.gov.uk/Topics/Statistics/Browse/Crime-

Justice/PubCriminalProceedings). The contract for monitoring compliance with Restriction of Liberty Orders is currently held by Serco Limited. Breach data can be requested from the Scottish Government if required.

Throughcare, Voluntary Assistance, Throughcare Addiction Service and Home Circumstance

13.16 Throughcare is the provision of a range of social work and associated services to prisoners and their families from the point of sentence or remand, during the period of imprisonment and following release into the community. Prisoners serving more than 4 years are released with a statutory obligation that they be supervised. Prisoners serving less than 4 years but who are short-term sex offenders (Section 15 of the Management of Offenders Etc. (Scot) Act 2005) or who are subject to an extended sentence or supervised release order are also supervised on release. Throughcare services have a primary objective of public protection, though they are also concerned with assisting prisoners to prepare for release and helping them to resettle into their community within the law.

13.17 Prior to 2004-05, some Local Authorities are known to have included data for Throughcare for serving prisoners and Voluntary Assistance in their figures for

Throughcare in the community. 2004-05 was the first year in which authorities were asked to provide separate figures for Throughcare in Custody, Throughcare in the Community and Voluntary Assistance. The figures for 2004-05 cannot therefore be directly compared with those for previous years. There were some further changes to the Throughcare data collection in 2005-06 and the tables are footnoted where these affect comparison with existing trends.

13.18 Voluntary assistance is available to prisoners not subject to statutory throughcare supervision on release but who request such a service while in custody or within 12 months of release. From 2005-06, figures on voluntary assistance include the Throughcare Addiction Service (TAS).

13.19 The Throughcare Addiction Service (TAS) commenced on 1 August 2005 and forms part of the voluntary aftercare service, which is often referred to as "Phase 2" of the Enhanced Throughcare Strategy. TAS is delivered by local authority criminal justice social work – or by one of their contracted service providers – who will work with the offender in the 6 week period prior to release from custody through the 6 week period post-release. The TAS worker will offer a more intensive motivational service and attempt to help the offender address their addiction (and associated) difficulties and link them into appropriate services. TAS is not normally available to those prisoners who are serving sentences of less than 31 days unless they are within the following two priority groups: female offenders and young male offenders (aged under 21 years). Information on TAS was collected for the first time via the 2005-06 aggregate return.

Diversion from Prosecution

13.20 Social Work Diversion schemes aim to provide persons accused of minor offences with support and advice in relation to problems associated with their offending. In such cases, prosecution is deferred, subject to successful completion of the scheme.

Bail Information

13.21 Bail Information was collected from local authorities for the first time in 2003-04. Bail information records assistance to Procurators Fiscal and courts through verification of information in respect of cases where bail might otherwise have been opposed or refused.

Sources of information

13.22 Form CJS, an aggregate return covering data on Social Enquiry Reports, Community Service Orders and Probation Orders, was introduced for the year ending 31 March 2000. The return is submitted annually by each local authority. Additional data items have been added to the return over time, including:

Supervised Attendance Orders - added from 2000-01 Throughcare (Statutory Post Release Supervision) – added from 2001-02 Diversion from Prosecution – added from 2001-02 Drug Treatment and Testing Orders – added from 2002-03 Bail information – added from 2003-04 Voluntary Assistance – added from 2004-05 Court Services – added from 2004-05 Throughcare Addiction Service – added from 2005-06

The content and format of the return continues to evolve, to reflect new demands for information and to clarify points of definition in relation to particular data items. Some caution should therefore be exercised when making comparisons over time.

13.23 The total population figures used as denominators in this bulletin are the relevant mid-year estimates for 16-70 year olds, as prepared by the General Register Office for Scotland (GROS).

13.24 Improvements in data quality are continuing, particularly for figures on breach applications where methodological changes have resulted in better recording of breaches.

13.25 The statistics presented in this bulletin reflect information on social work orders in the financial year April 2008 to March 2009 as known to the Scottish Government at February 2010. They may therefore differ slightly from those published previously, and may be subject to revision in future bulletins in this series.
