# Self-directed Support (Direct Payments), Scotland, 2010

## 1. Introduction and key points

This Statistics Release presents the latest figures for Self-directed Support (Direct Payments). The latest figures apply to payments made during the period 1<sup>st</sup> April 2009 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2010 under section 12B of the Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968. People who receive Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) are able to purchase and manage for themselves some or all of the care they have been assessed as needing. They are one way of increasing the flexibility, choice, and control people have over the care they receive, so that they can live more independently in their communities. A client may have more than one payment during the year.

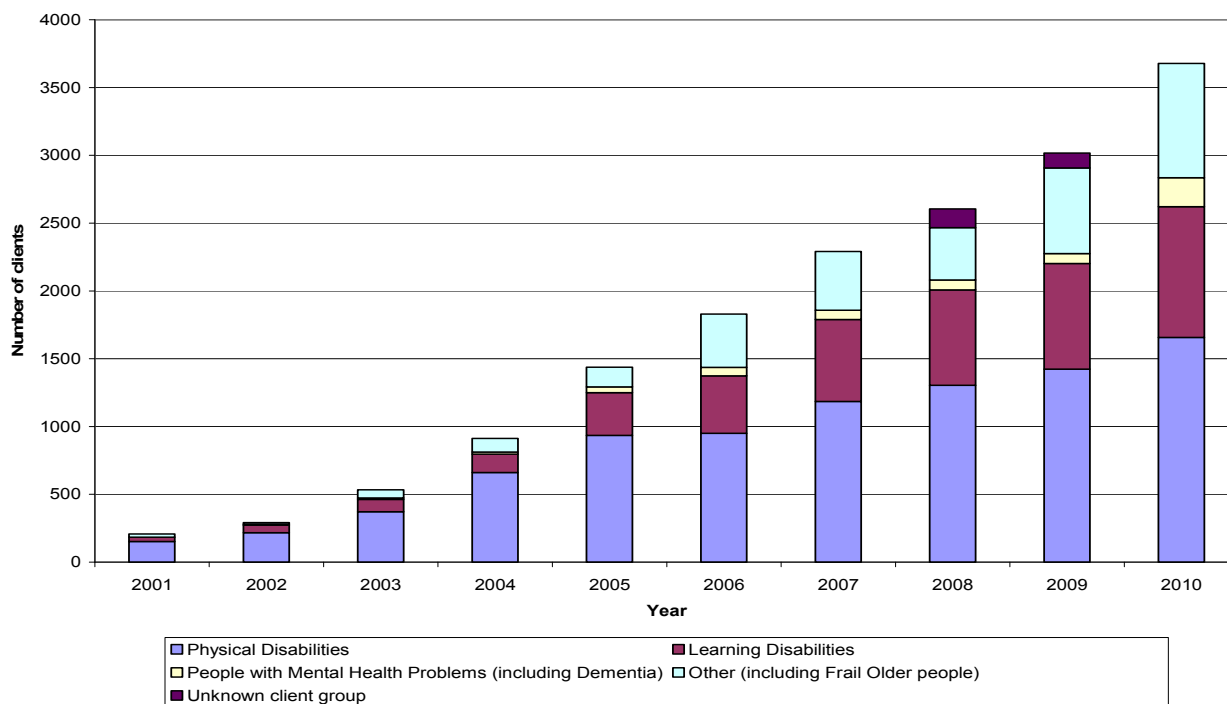
Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) have been available to disabled people aged 18-64 since April 1997, and to disabled people aged 65 and over since July 2000. Since 21 December 2001 they have also been available to disabled 16 and 17 year olds and disabled parents for children's services. From 1 June 2003 it became a duty for local authorities to offer direct payments in place of providing services to all eligible disabled people aged 16 and over and to parents (or those with parental responsibility) for disabled children aged 15 and under.

The information is derived from returns made to the Scottish Government by Scottish Local Authorities. Figures may not sum due to incomplete data.

### Key findings

- The number of people in receipt of Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) has increased each year from 207 in 2001 to 3,678 in the year to 31st March 2010.
- The number of people in receipt of Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) has increased from 3,017 in 2009 to 3,678 in 2010, an increase of 22 per cent.
- The value of direct payments has increased each year from £2.1 million in 2001 to £40.2 million in 2010.
- The value of direct payments has increased from £33.0 million in 2009 to £40.2 million in 2010, an increase of 22 per cent.
- 45 per cent of people receiving Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) had a physical disability and 23 per cent had a learning disability. A further 3 per cent had both a physical and a learning disability.

**Chart 1: Number of people receiving Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) packages, 2001-2010**



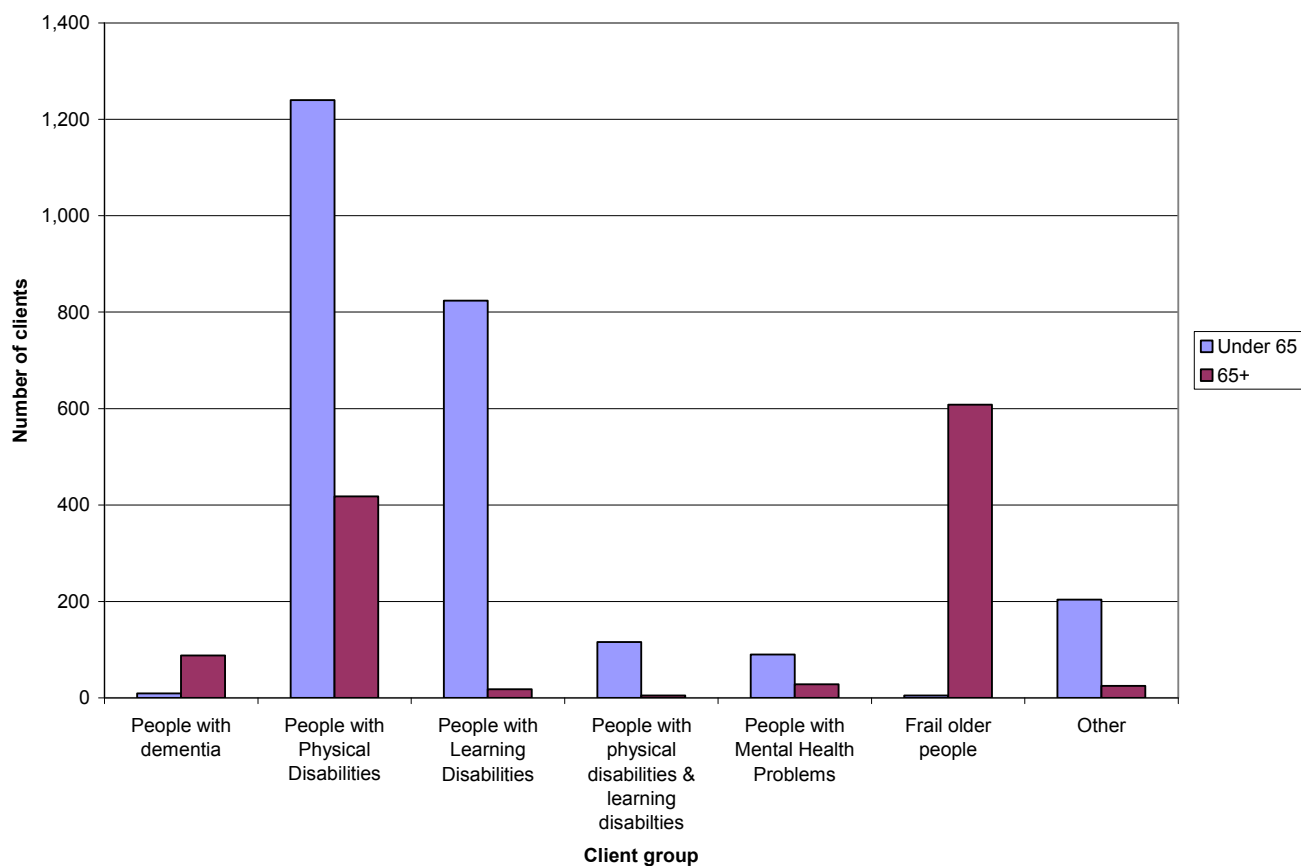

## 2. Scotland Analysis

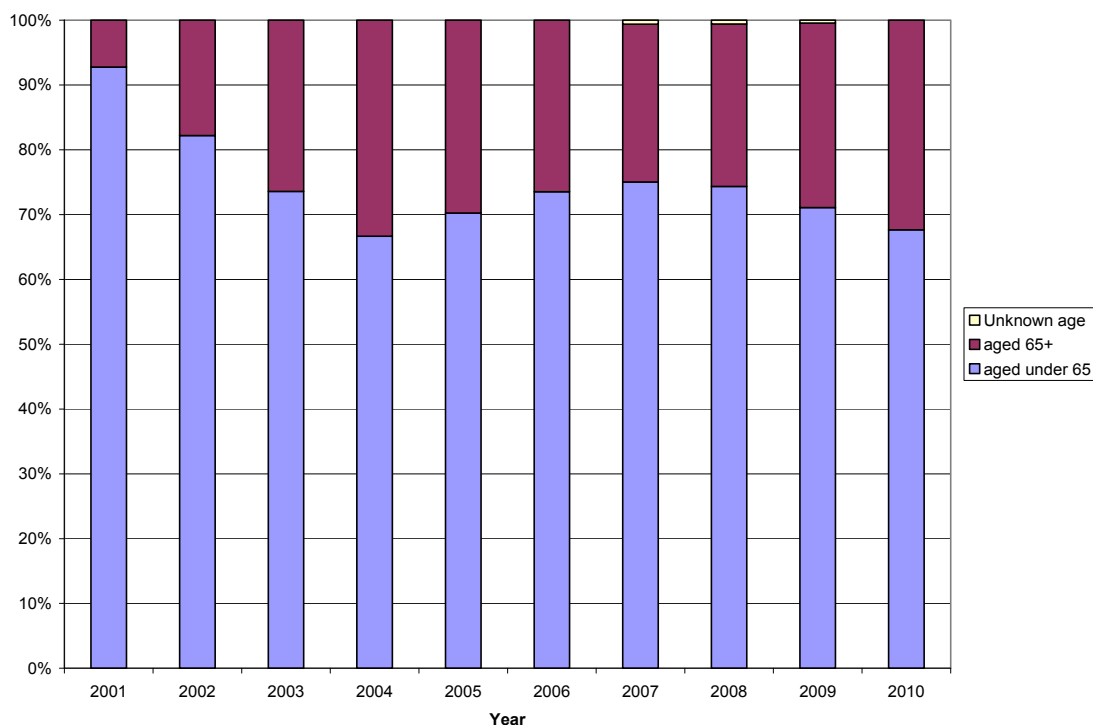
Figures behind the charts are available in the annex.

- Across Scotland 3,678 people received Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) in the year 2009/10, an increase of 661 (22 per cent) from the 2008/09 level.
- 45 per cent of these 3,678 people received Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) due to a physical disability. 3 per cent of those receiving Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) in 2009/10 were due to having a learning disability and a physical disability. 23 per cent receiving Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) in 2009/10 were due to a learning disability.

**Chart 3: Percentage of people receiving Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) packages by age, 2001-2010**



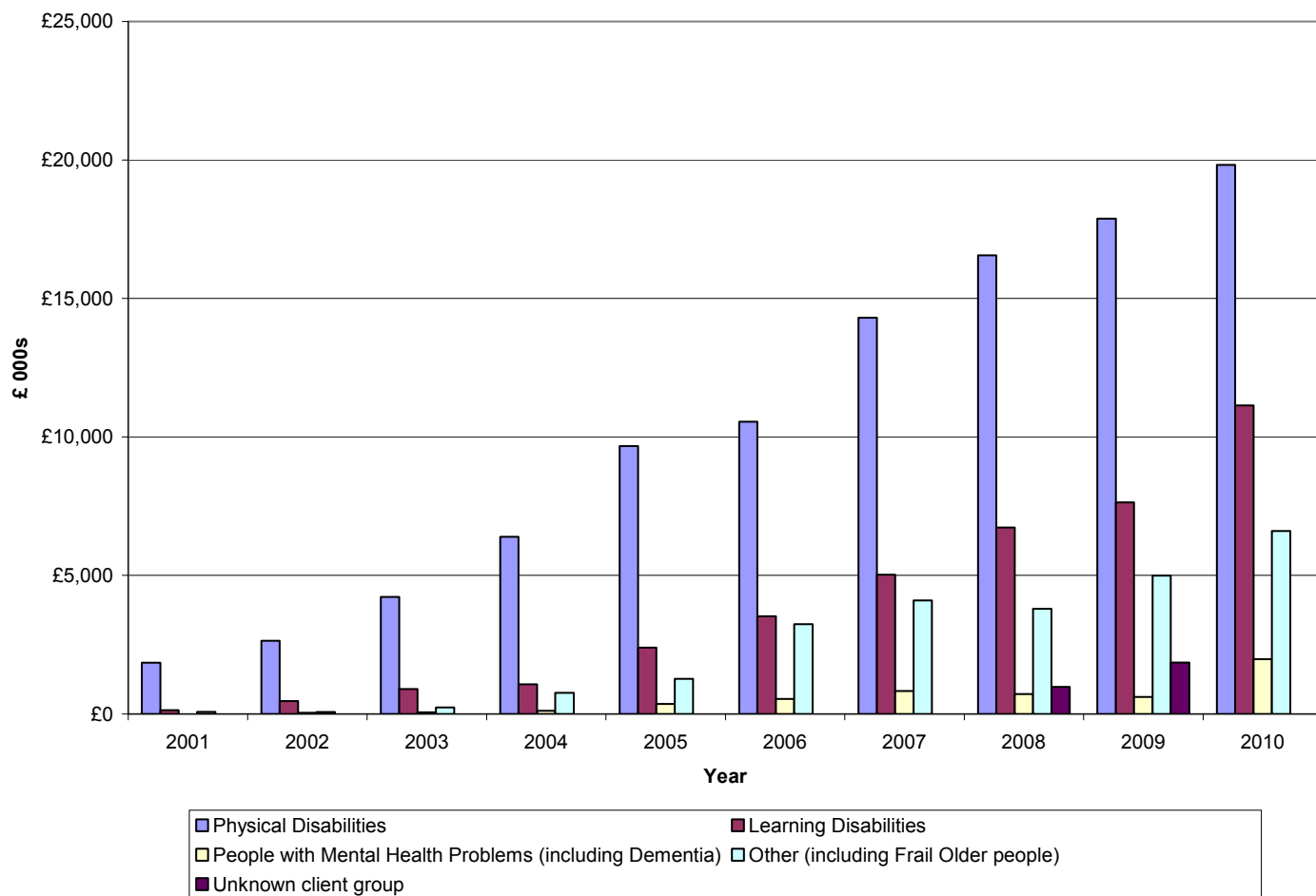
- The age profile of Self-directed Support (Direct Payment) clients has changed since 2001, with a greater proportion of recipients now aged 65 or over. In 2001 only 7 per cent of recipients were in this age group, compared to 32 per cent of clients in 2010.
- In the year to 31 March 2010, 1,190 payments (32 per cent of the total) were made to people aged over 65.
- There were slightly more females than males in receipt of Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) in 2010, 55 per cent compared to 45 per cent.

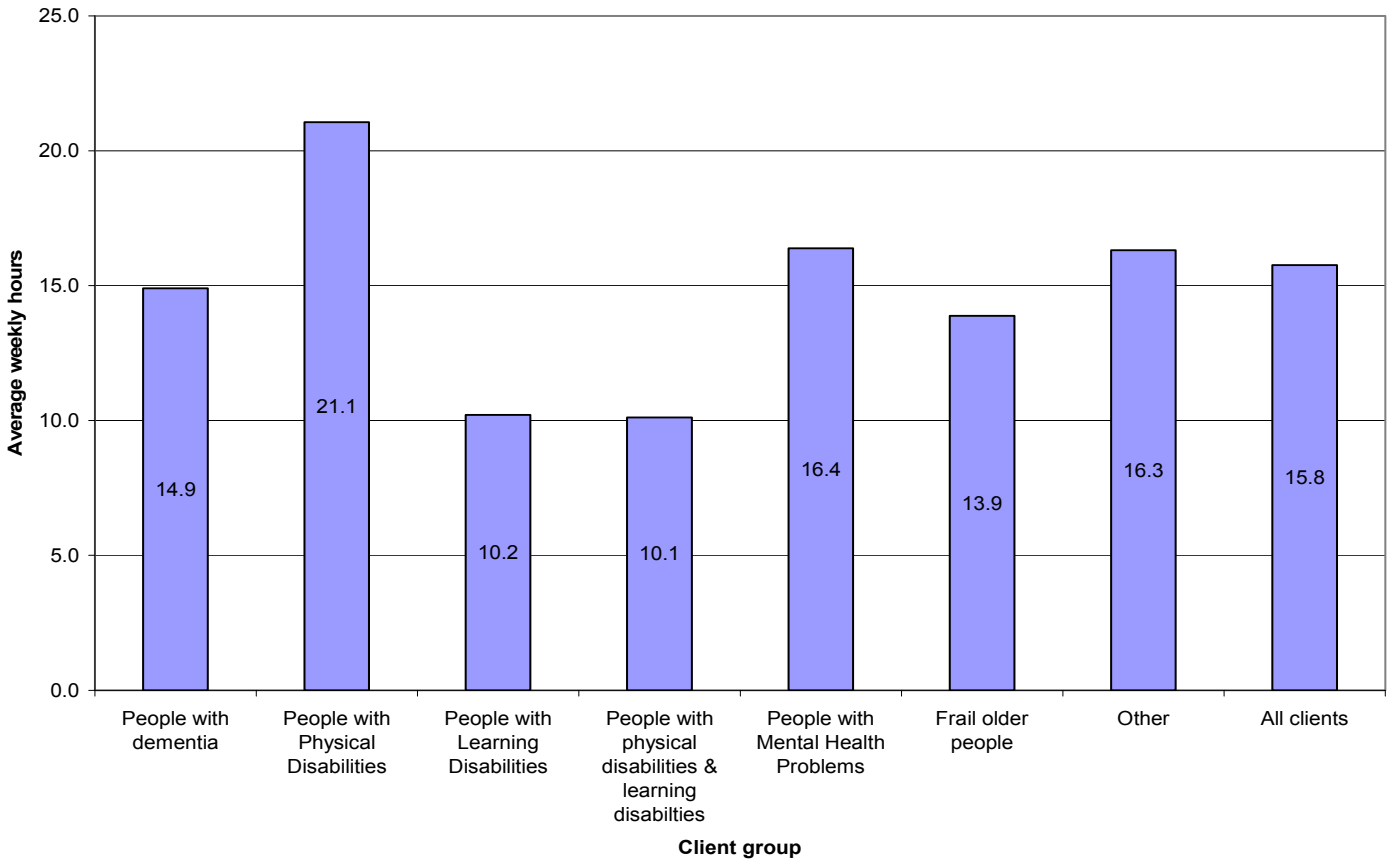
**Chart 4: Value of Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) packages, 2001-2010**

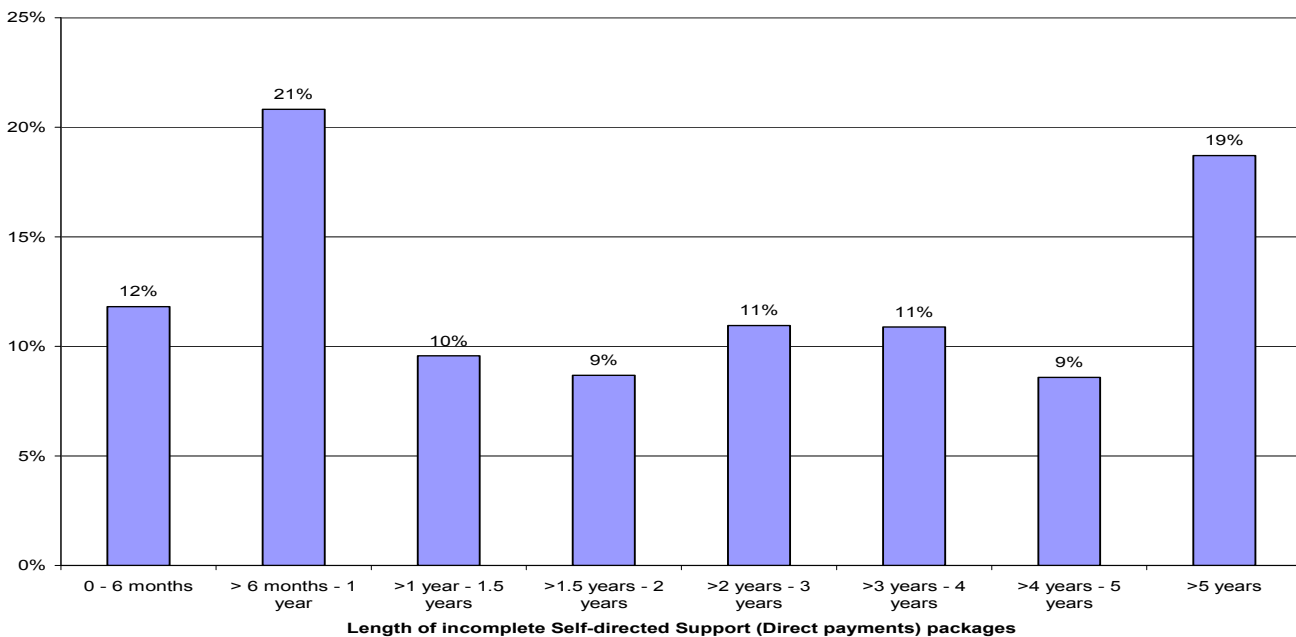
- The total value of direct payments has steadily increased from 2001, and £40.2 million was spent in the year to 31 March 2010. Most of this, around £19.8 million, was spent on people with physical disabilities (49 per cent).

**Chart 5: Average weekly hours in a Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) package - 2010**



- On average there were 15.8 hours per week in a direct payment package in 2009/10. This varied slightly between client groups with an average of 16.4 hours per week in direct payment packages for people with mental health problems, 13.9 hours per week for frail older people, and 21.1 hours per week in those for people with physical disabilities.

- Of the direct payments which were ongoing on 31 March 2010, 33 per cent had been in place for a year or less. A further 19 per cent had been going for over 1 year but less than 2 years and 19 per cent of payments had been in place for over 5 years.

- 68 per cent of all packages of Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) were for personal care, whilst 1 per cent was for equipment and temporary adaptations.

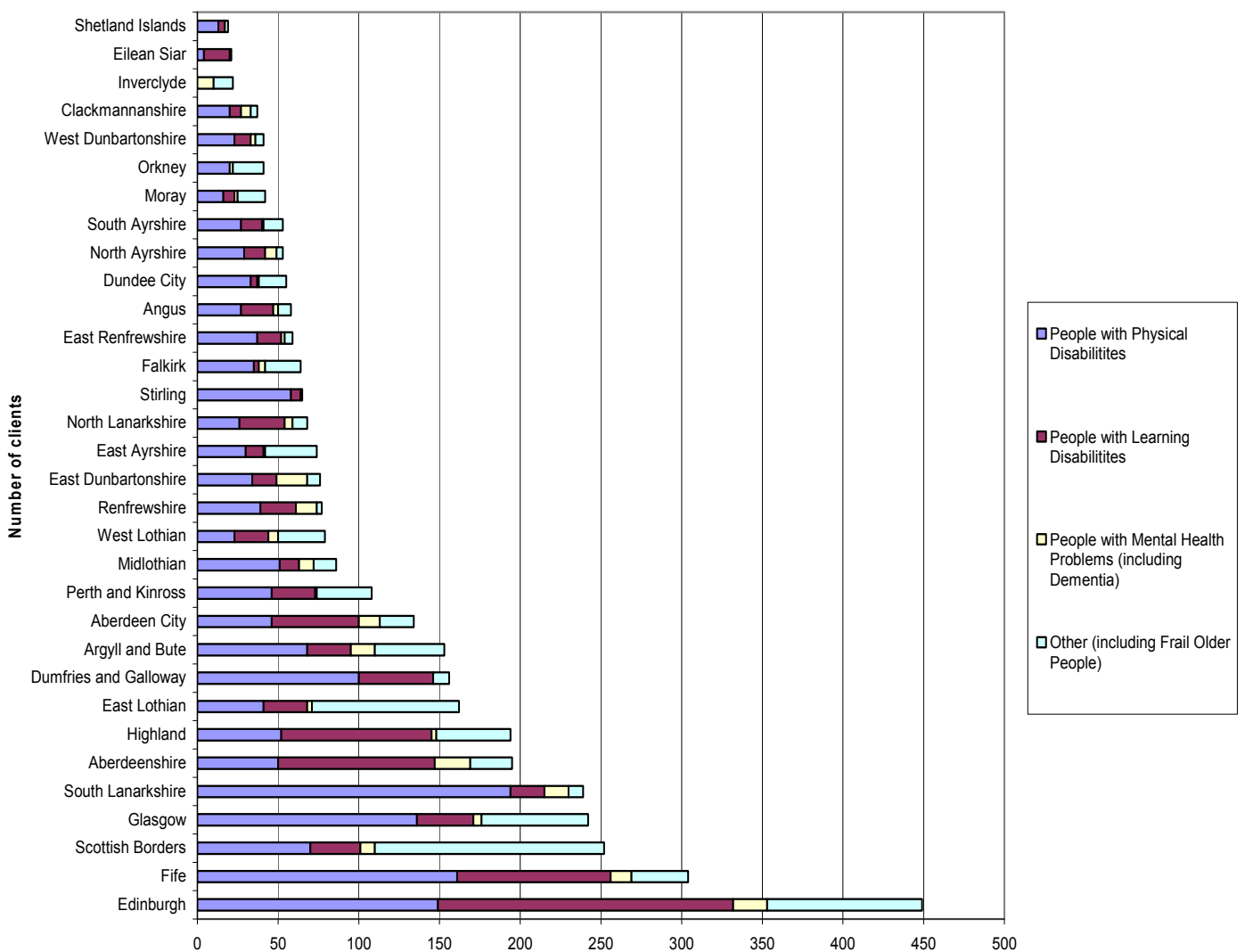
- 44 per cent of all packages of Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) involved a personal assistant.

### 3. Local Authority Analysis

- All Local Authorities made payments for packages of Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) during the year to 31 March 2010.
- City of Edinburgh council had the most number of people receiving Self-directed Support (Direct payments) packages. (12 per cent of the Scotland total) and these payments amounted to just under £7 million. Shetland Islands had the smallest number of clients with 19 people receiving payments.
- All but 4 Local Authorities had more people receiving payments in 2010 than in the previous year.

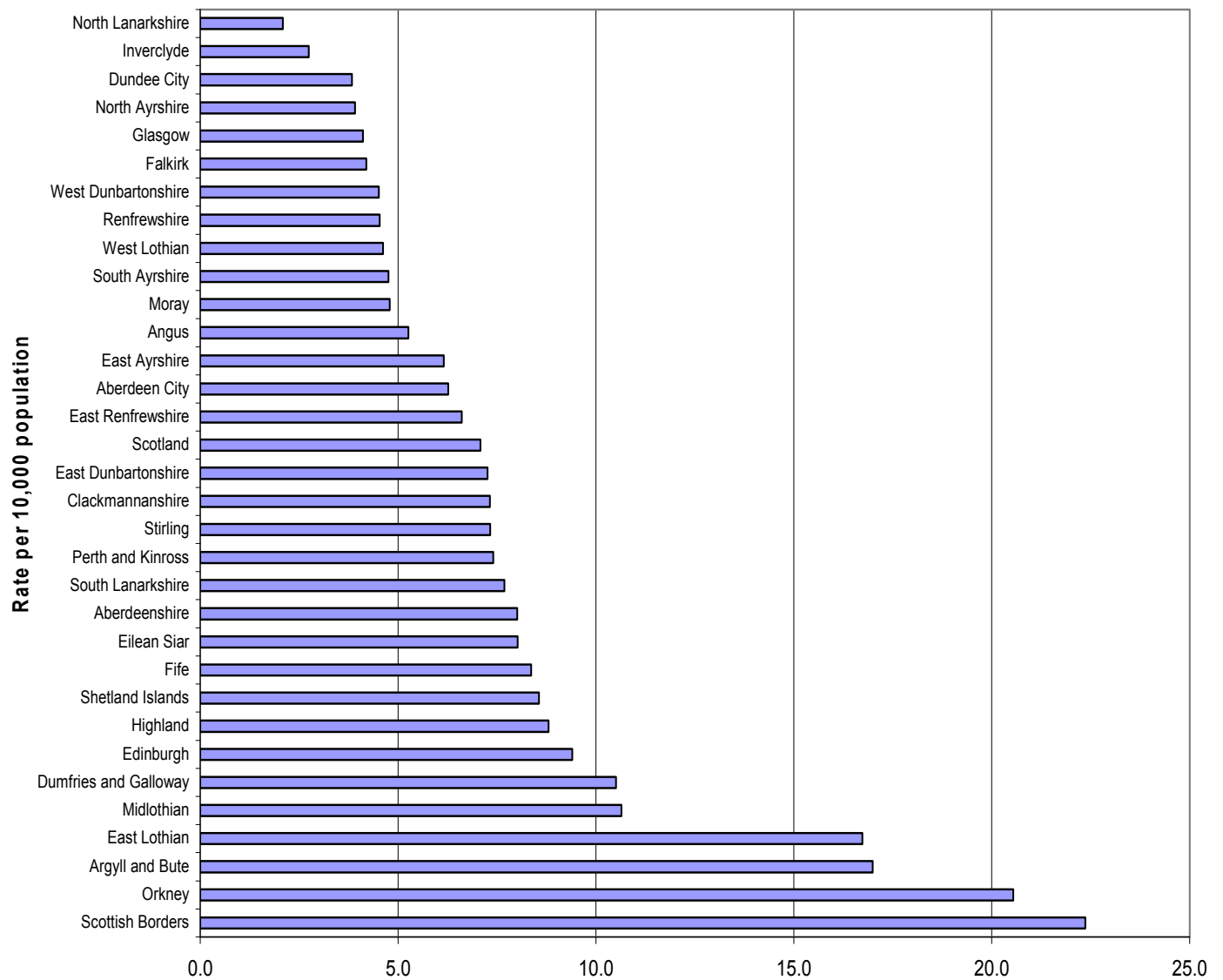

#### **4. Background information on the collection of the data**

The Self-directed Support (Direct Payments) survey began in 2001 and collects information on Direct Payments from all Local Authorities in Scotland.

The format of the survey was changed in 2006 to a person based return. This may have resulted in some inconsistency compared to previous years. The new survey asks for gender, date of birth, client group, value of direct payment throughout the year, weekly hours in the direct payment package, type of direct payment provision and type of care delivery along with a number of other variables.

The new form has allowed for more accurate calculation of average direct payment values. These are calculated by determining for how many days each person received a direct payment in 2009/10 ( see 'average value 2' in Annex Table 4). The value of the direct payment is then divided by this number of days and the result is multiplied by the number of days in the year to estimate the value of a direct payment if the had client received it throughout the entire year. This can then be averaged to allow more accurate comparisons between, for example, client groups.

This publication contains average direct payment values calculated using both methods to allow for the continuation of existing time series.

In 2010, the data collection changed from an Excel form to local authorities submitting the data to the Scottish Government by ProcXed.Net. ProcXed.Net aims to support and promote the electronic exchange of information in Scotland. It reduces administrative burdens and increases the speed, ease and accuracy (via inbuilt data validation checks) of information exchange. It additionally encourages best practice and improves access to benchmarking information. Moreover, the system provides a secure method of sharing data. Further information about ProcXed.Net can be provided on request using the contact details below.

In 2010, the client group categories were reviewed by Community Care Statistics and aligned to the 2010 home care statistical return. It may not be possible therefore, to directly compare some client group analysis over time. In addition, direct payments which were used for respite, are excluded from the weekly hours analysis and are now recorded separately. This will effect the trends over time of the weekly hours data which used to include an estimate for respite.

All 32 local authorities provided information. However, Renfrewshire were unable to provide detailed information about the packages of support. An estimated value of their packages has been included in the Scotland total based on the average value of direct payment for Scotland, multiplied by the estimated number of packages for Renfrewshire (based on the number of clients which was provided).

Some column totals in the tables in this document may not exactly equal the sum of their component parts due to the effects of rounding.
