RACIST INCIDENTS RECORDED BY THE POLICE IN SCOTLAND, 2009-10

1. Introduction

This bulletin presents statistics on racist incidents recorded and cleared up by the eight Scottish police forces in 2009-10. The definition of a racist incident, as given by Sir William MacPherson in his Report on the Stephen Lawrence Inquiry, is "any incident which is perceived to be racist by the victim or any other person".

Any racist incident reported to the police may involve one or more victims, one or more perpetrators, and result in one or more crimes or offences being recorded. This bulletin reports details of all incidents, all crimes or offences associated with each incident, and, where possible, details of the victims and perpetrators. It is also important to note that these statistics only cover racist incidents reported to the police, not all racist incidents.




Chart 1 Racist incidents recorded by the police in Scotland, 2004-05 to 2009-10

2. Commentary

2.1 Incidents recorded by the police, by police force area

The total number of racist incidents recorded by the police in Scotland fell by four per cent between 2008-09 and 2009-10 (from 5,143 to 4,952). The number of crimes recorded decreased from 6,615 crimes in 2008-09 to 5,819 crimes in 2009-10, which equates to a decrease of 12 per cent (Table 1).

Two forces showed a year on year increase in the number of racist incidents recorded from 2008-09 to 2009-10 (Lothian & Borders and Strathclyde), while Fife and Grampian remained at a similar level as in 2008-09. All other police forces showed a decrease between 2008-09 and 2009-10. The number of crimes recorded between 2008-09 and 2009-10 decreased in all eight police forces.

The number of incidents, as a rate per 10,000 local population, is generally higher in urban areas (Aberdeen, Edinburgh and Glasgow) than in more rural areas (Table 2).

Over the period 2004-05 to 2009-10, racist incidents in Scotland have increased by 10 per cent. There could be a number of reasons for this. Forces' work with a range of victim support agencies to encourage reporting may be one reason for this increase. Other factors which could have impacted on the numbers are an increasing public intolerance of such behaviour, and increased public confidence that reporting such incidents is worthwhile. There have also been improvements in data collection by police forces, and the introduction of centralised call centres has encouraged the reporting of all incidents. It should be noted however that the number of racist incidents recorded has been falling since 2006-07.

2.2 Detail of the incidents

Various information was recorded in relation to the incident, such as the location where the incident took place, the date and time of the incident, and whether a crime was recorded as part of the incident.

In 2009-10, around 98 per cent of incidents recorded resulted in one or more crimes being recorded (Table 1).

As shown in Table 3, the most common locations for an incident in 2009-10 were the street (32 per cent), a dwelling house (19 per cent) and in a shop (18 per cent). These three locations therefore accounted for 69 per cent of all racist incidents in 2009-10, compared with around 63 per cent for these three locations in 2008-09. Note however that information for 2009-10 is based on all forces apart from Lothian and Borders who were unable to provide data on location of incident due to differences in classifications between their own recorded systems and our data collection template.

The most common times at which an incident occurred were between Friday night and Sunday night with more incidents generally occurring between the hours of 18:00 to midnight.(Chart 3 and Table 5).

Approximately 75 per cent of incidents in 2009-10 were reported to the police by the victim, which is an increase from 73 per cent in 2008-09. Other reporters included witnesses of the incident, the police and agencies reporting on behalf of the victim (Table 6). Information for 2009-10 is based on all forces apart from Lothian and Borders who were unable to provide data on who reported the incident.





Chart 2 Incidents by financial year and quarter, 2004-05 to 2009-10

2.3 Crimes Recorded

The most frequently recorded crime/offence in 2009-10 was racially aggravated conduct, which accounted for 65 per cent of all crimes recorded as part of racist incidents. This is followed by breach of the peace (13 per cent), minor assault (9 per cent), fire-raising/vandalism (5 per cent), and racially aggravated harassment (3 per cent). In each year, these five crimes and offences account for 95 per cent of all crimes and offences recorded as part of a racist incident (Table 7a). Definitions of racially aggravated conduct and racially aggravated harassment are included in note 3.6.

Overall, nearly 68 per cent of all racist crimes recorded in 2009-10 were cleared-up (Table 7b). The clear-up rate differs depending on the crime. Approximately 41 per cent of racist crimes involving fire-raising, vandalism etc were cleared up, while there was a clear up rate of 97 per cent for 'other crimes' (including handling offensive weapons and drug crimes). A definition of 'Cleared-up' can be found in note 3.5.

2.4 Victims of racist incidents

In 2009-10, around 48 per cent of victims, where ethnic origin was known, were of Asian origin (that is, Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi, Chinese or other Asian), with the majority being Pakistani (Table 8). The largest minority ethnic group in the Scottish population is Pakistani, based on the 2001 Census figures (note 3.10).

The percentage of male victims in 2009-10 has remained more or less unchanged at around 75 per cent of all victims, where gender was known. In 2009-10, there were an additional 265 victims whose age and/or gender were not recorded and these were not included when calculating the above percentage (Table 10).

In 2009-10, around 74 per cent of victims reporting an incident were doing so for the first time. 15 per cent of victims had made one or two previous reports. These percentages are based on those incidents for which previous incident information is known. When recording whether the victim had reported previous racist incidents within the previous two years to the police, it is not always possible to determine the number of incidents previously reported. These have been described as 'unknown' in the data (Table 11). Unknown will also include victims for whom it is not known if they are a repeat victim or not.

2.5 Perpetrators of racist incidents

Information about perpetrators of racist incidents is only fully available where the incident has been fully resolved, and any crime involved has been cleared up (see note 3.5 for definition of cleared up). For incidents where this information was available, in each year, approximately 96 per cent of perpetrators were of white origin (including White British, White Irish, Gypsy/Traveller, White Polish and other white) (Table 12).

In 2009-10, around 99 per cent of perpetrators of racist incidents had English as their main language (Table 13) (where language was known).

Around 47 per cent of perpetrators in 2009-10 were aged 20 or under. Around 23 per cent were under the age of 16, making them eligible for referral to the Scottish Children's Reporter Administration (SCRA) rather than the Procurator Fiscal (Table 14). In 2009-10, there were an additional 386 perpetrators whose age and/or gender were not recorded. These were not included when calculating the above percentages.

In 2009-10, 72 per cent of perpetrators were referred to the Procurator Fiscal or SCRA. No further action was taken against 4 per cent of perpetrators (Table 15).

3. Notes on the statistics used in this bulletin

3.1 Background

In response to the Stephen Lawrence Inquiry in 1999, the then Scottish Executive produced an action plan to progress the recommendations set out in the MacPherson report, which included the setting up of a statistical collection covering racist incidents.

The definition of a racist incident as given by Sir William MacPherson in his Report on the Stephen Lawrence Inquiry is:

"A racist incident is any incident which is perceived to be racist by the victim or any other person."

In the context of the data for this bulletin, the above definition was used.

3.2 Returns

The return from which figures in this bulletin are taken is a simple count of the number of incidents recorded by the police and the crimes, victims and perpetrators arising from these incidents. Only returns from the eight Scottish police forces are included in this bulletin.

Due to recording issues, Lothian & Borders Police were unable to provide data for 2009-10 on the location of the incident, who first reported the incident, any agency to whom the incident was first reported, the main language of the victim and perpetrator or the action taken against the perpetrator.

3.3 Recording Issues

In an incident, one or more victims may be involved, and there may be one or more perpetrators. There may be no criminal element, or several crimes or offences may occur.

In Scotland, assault is a common law offence. In order to distinguish between serious and minor assaults, police forces use a common definition of what constitutes a serious assault. Definitions are listed in note 3.6.

Quality assurance checks during the preparation of this bulletin has shown that there is an inconsistency in the number of crimes recorded by the eight Scottish police forces. Some forces have reported only the racist crimes associated with the racist incidents and others have reported all crimes associated with the racist incident. As a result, there may be an over count in the number of crimes recorded as part of a racist incident. Further work will be undertaken to address this issue prior to the next publication.

Due to changes in Lothian & Borders Police's recording practices, the classification used to describe the *location of an incident* resulted in an increase in the number of incidents being recorded at 'sporting venues' and 'other businesses' in 2008-09. This

corresponds to a decrease in the number of incidents recorded at locations classified as 'shops'. These variations do not represent a change in the locations crime are being committed. It has not been possible to rectify this problem for 2009-10 and so data relating to location of incidents for 2009-10 does not include Lothian & Borders.

3.4 Reporting Practices

These statistics do not record every occurrence of racist incidents in Scotland. Not all incidents are reported to the police. The 2009-10 Scottish Crime and Justice Survey¹ estimated that approximately 37 per cent of *all* crimes came to the attention of the police.

3.5 Crimes and offences cleared up

The definition of "cleared up" is noted below. This definition came into force with effect from 1 April 1996.

A crime or offence is regarded as cleared up where there exists a sufficiency of evidence under Scots law, to justify consideration of criminal proceedings notwithstanding that a report is not submitted to the Procurator Fiscal because either

 (i) by standing agreement with the Procurator Fiscal, the police warn the accused due to the minor nature of the offence, or
 (ii) reporting is inappropriate due to the non-age of the accused, death of the accused or other similar circumstances.

3.6 Definitions

Racially-aggravated - the offender asserts towards the person affected, malice and ill-will based on that person's membership (or presumed membership) of a racial group; or the course of conduct or action is motivated (wholly or partly) by malice and ill-will towards members of a racial group based on their membership of that group.

Racially-aggravated harassment - a racially-aggravated course of conduct, amounting to harassment.

Racially-aggravated conduct - to act in a manner, including speech, which is racially aggravated and which causes, or is intended to cause, a person alarm or distress.

Serious Assault - A serious assault is an assault in which the victim sustains an injury resulting in detention in hospital as an in-patient for the treatment of that injury, or any of the following injuries, whether or not detained in hospital; fractures (mean the breaking or cracking of a bone), internal injuries, severe concussion, loss of consciousness, lacerations requiring sutures which may lead to impairment or disfigurement.

Please note – nose is cartilage, not bone, so a 'broken nose' should not be classified as a serious assault unless it meets one of the other criteria.

Ethnicity – 2009-10 is the first year in which forces were asked to use the new classification of 21 groups (listed below) to record the ethnic group of victim and perpetrator. An individual is asked to 'self declare' their ethnic origin. Due to differences in recording systems used, not all police forces have been able to provide data using the new classification for 2009-10 and for these areas, data was provided on the basis of the 13 group classification instead.

In order to compare ethnic classifications over the time period covered by the bulletin, the new crime classifications have been aggregated to match the previous classification of 13 groups. This aggregation is detailed below.

In Table 8, detailing ethnic origin of victims, the changes between 2008-09 and 2009-10 may be due in part to the changes in classification, therefore trend data should be treated with caution. This is less of a problem for Table 12, Ethnic Origin of perpetrators, as the groups have had to be aggregated for disclosure purposes.

Ethnic Groups collected:

Incident - an incident is any communication by whatever means about a matter which comes to the police attention which they may be required to act upon.

Crime - an act committed in violation of the law (common law or statute). Any single incident may include a number of crimes, or there might be no criminal element.

Victim - in any incident, there could be one or more victims.

Perpetrator - in any incident, there could be one or more perpetrators.

3.7 Total incidents, crimes, victims and perpetrators

The following totals indicate the data collected. Note that crimes, victims and perpetrators can have multiple entries per incident as well as multiple entries with one another (i.e. one crime may have several victims/perpetrators):

3.8 Classification

Contraventions of Scottish criminal law are divided for statistical purposes into crimes and offences. The term "crime" is *generally* used for the more serious criminal acts; the less serious are termed "offences", although the term "offence" may also be used in relation to serious breaches of criminal law. The distinction is made only for working purposes and the "seriousness" of the offence is *generally* related to the maximum sentence that can be imposed.

The detailed classification of crimes and offences used by The Scottish Government to collect criminal statistics contains about 360 codes. These are grouped in the bulletin as shown in note 4.

3.9 Scottish Crime Recording Standard

It is expected that the numbers of crimes would have been affected by the implementation (from 1 April 2004) of the Scottish Crime Recording Standard (SCRS), which means that no corroborative evidence is required initially to record a crime related incident as a crime if so perceived by the victim. This was expected to increase the numbers of minor crimes recorded by the police, such as minor crimes of vandalism, minor assaults and breach of the peace.

Previously, where there were crimes which the victim did not wish the police to actively investigate (for instance, if they were concerned that this could lead to more trouble), the crime itself would not have been recorded. Therefore the SCRS is thought to have caused an increase in the number of crimes recorded where there is no real possibility of clearing up the crime, which has an impact on the clear up rates.

3.10 Census figures for Scottish Population 2001

The following table gives the most recent Census figures for the ethnicity of the population of Scotland.
