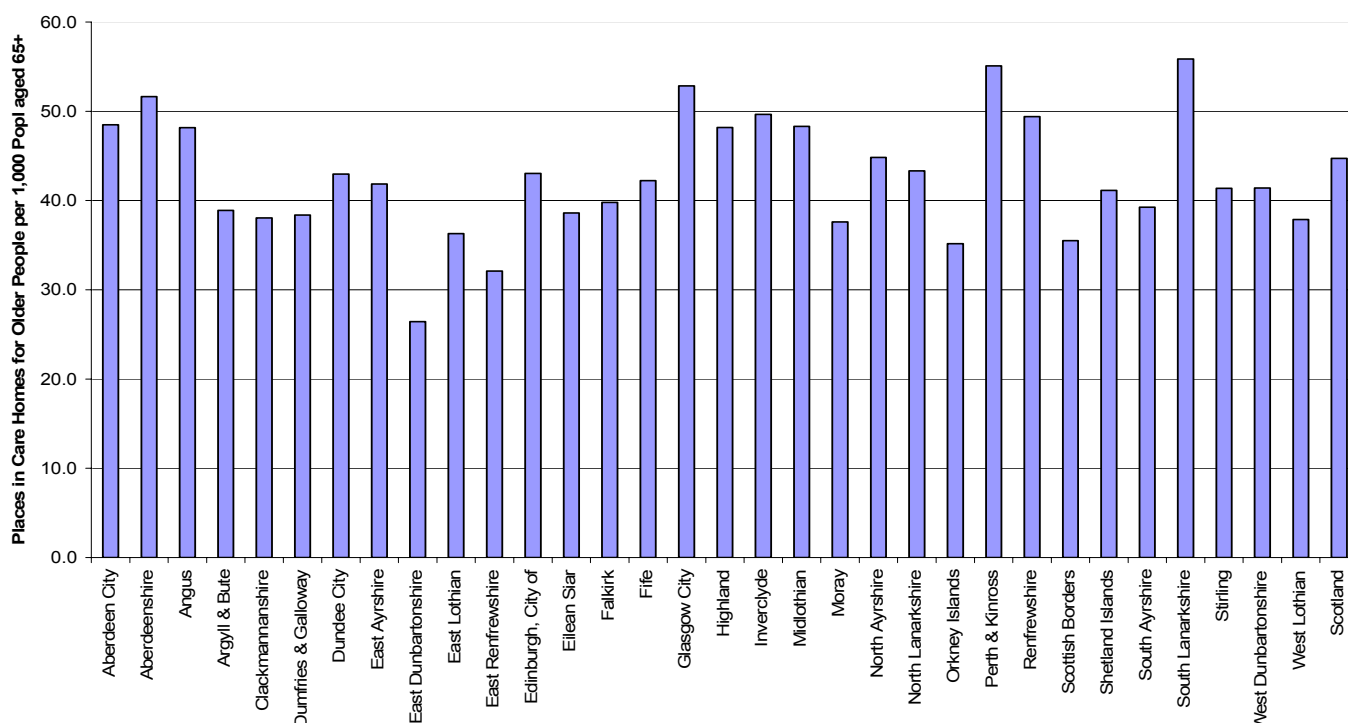


1. Introduction and key points

The purpose of this Statistics Release is to present national figures for care homes for adults in Scotland. All figures relate to 31 March 2008 and are provisional. As such they are subject to change. The final figures will be published in subsequent statistics bulletins. The information is derived from the Scottish Care Home Census.

Some of the information which used to be collected as part of the Scottish Care Home Census is now collected by the Care Commission. This information is not included in this publication. More details of this can be found in the background information section at the end of this statistics release. All figures in this release omit care homes that deregistered to become Housing Support services.

Chart 1: Places in Care Homes for Older People per 1,000 Population Aged 65+, March 2008



- At 31 March 2008 there were a total of 1,426 registered care homes providing 42,874 places to 37,471 residents.
- There were 942 care homes for older people as at 31 March 2008 compared to 1,060 at 31 March 2000.
- There were 37,829 registered places in care homes for older people. The number of places has increased by 0.7 per cent since March 2007 and decreased by 3.5 per cent from the March 2000 level.
- The number of care homes for adults with learning disabilities has decreased by 19.2 per cent since March 2000, from 386 to 312 as at March 2008.

In March 2008 there were 942 care homes for older people. Of these 176 (18.7 per cent) were run by a Local Authority or by the NHS, 623 (66.1 per cent) were privately owned and the remaining 143 (15.2 per cent) were in the voluntary sector. In total, there were 118 fewer homes for older people in March 2008 than in March 2000 (when there were 1,060 such homes) and 9 fewer than in March 2007.

The 37,829 registered places in March 2008 represents 44.7 places per 1,000 population and consists of 5,256 places (13.9 per cent) in the Local Authority/NHS sector, 28,321 places (74.9 per cent) in the private sector and 4,252 places (11.2 per cent) in the voluntary sector. Between March 2000 and March 2008 the total number of registered places had fallen by 1,375 (3.5 per cent). In the Local Authority/NHS sector there had been a decrease of 1,200 places (18.6 per cent) whilst in the private sector there had been an increase of 352 places (1.3 per cent). Finally, in the voluntary sector there had been a decrease of 527 places (a reduction of 11 per cent).

Annex Table 3 and chart 1 show the number of places per 1,000 population aged 65+ for each local authority. East Dunbartonshire had 26.4 places per 1,000 population aged 65+, the fewest of all local authorities, whilst South Lanarkshire had the most at 55.9 places per 1,000 population aged 65+.

Between March 2000 and March 2008, the number of residents had fallen by 1,317 (3.8 per cent) from 34,457 to 33,140.

Table 2 shows the local authorities with the largest percentage increases and decreases in the number of registered places in care homes for older people, between March 2000 and March 2008. Annex Table 2 contains details of registered places for each census between these dates for all local authorities. The biggest percentage increase in registered places since March 2000 occurred in Clackmannanshire where the number of registered places has risen from 203 in March 2000 to 288 in March 2008 (a 41.9 per cent increase). Other local authorities to have experienced large increases in the percentage of registered places were the Orkney Islands, North Lanarkshire, and Renfrewshire. The biggest percentage decrease in the number of registered places since March 2000 occurred in Stirling. Here there had been a 23.1 per cent decrease, a reduction of 180 places. Other local authorities to have experienced a large decrease were East Lothian, Aberdeen City and North Ayrshire.

In care homes run by local authorities or by the NHS there were a total of 10,434 admissions. These accounted for 34.5 per cent of all admissions. In the Local Authority/NHS sector, the majority of admissions (84.4 per cent) were for a short stay or respite care.

In the private sector there were a total of 16,361 admissions, 9,528 (58.2 per cent) of which were long stay and 6,833 (41.8 per cent) short stay or respite. In total these represented 54.1 per cent of all admissions and included 76.7 per cent of all long stay and 38.3 per cent of all short stay admissions.

Admissions in the voluntary sector accounted for the remaining 11.4 per cent of all admissions including 10.1 per cent of all long stay and 12.3 per cent of all short stay admissions.

Between 31 March 2007 and 31 March 2008, 21,047 residents were discharged from care homes. 3,680 of these discharges were long stay residents and 17,367 were short stay residents. Discharges from local authority run homes accounted for 45.6 per cent of all discharges whilst a further 42.8 per cent of discharges were of residents in the private sector and 11.6 per cent were in the voluntary sector.

During the year preceding the most recent census 9,281 care home residents died.

Of these the majority, 9,036 were long stay residents.

On 31 March 2008 there were 40 care homes for physically disabled people providing 507 places and housing 462 residents.

Since March 2000 the number of care homes has increased from 39 to 46 in 2004-2006 before dropping back to 40 homes in March 2008. In the same period, the number of registered places has fallen from 823, a reduction of 316 places, and the number of residents has dropped from 723, down by 261. Of the 40 care homes for physically disabled people, the majority, 29 (or 72.5 per cent) were operated by voluntary organisations. These voluntary homes offered 385 places to residents (75.9 per cent of all places). Of the remaining 11 care homes, 3 were operated by local authorities and 8 were in the private sector. The private sector has grown in size since March 2000 with an additional 5 care homes and 37 places by March 2008.

On the most recent census night there were 84 care homes in Scotland for adults with mental health problems. Of these 75 per cent (63 homes) were run by voluntary organisations. The 84 care homes offered a total of 1,086 places.

The 63 care homes in the voluntary sector offered a total of 681 places. This compares to 16 privately owned care homes which offered a total of 324 places and housed 273 residents. The 5 local authority run care homes offered a total of 81 places.

Since March 2000, the number of care homes offering services in this client group has dropped by 41, from 125. Over the same period the number of places has decreased by 111 and the number of residents by 150.

On 31 March 2008 there were 312 care homes for adults with learning disabilities. These homes offered a total of 2,791 places and had 2,415 residents.

65.4 per cent (204) of the care homes in this client group and 50.3 per cent (1,404) of the registered places were in the voluntary sector whilst 69 care homes (22.1 per cent) were in the private sector and 39 (12.5 per cent) were run by local authorities. The average size of these care homes varied between sectors. There were, on average, 7 places in voluntary sector homes, 9 places in local authority homes and 15 places in privately operated care homes.

Since March 2000, the number of care homes has fallen by 74 from 386 in 2000 to the current level of 312 homes. There has been a corresponding drop in the number of places from 3,624 to 2,791. This is a reduction of 833 places (23 per cent). The number of residents in care homes for adults with learning disabilities has fallen by 906 from 3,321 in March 2000 to 2,415 in March 2008.

Care homes registered for other types of user can include homes for adults with acquired brain injuries, mothers and children, alcohol related problems, drugs related problems, AIDS/HIV and other vulnerable groups.

In March 2008 there were a total of 48 care homes for adults in other client groups. These homes offered a total of 661 places, an average of 14 places per home, and had 547 residents. The majority of the 48 homes (42 homes or 87.5 per cent of all homes) operated in the voluntary sector and these homes offered a total of 516 places. Of the remaining 6 care homes, 3 were run by local authorities and 3 were privately run. The local authority run homes offered a total of 42 places whilst the 3 private homes offered 103 places.

Since March 2000 the number of care homes in this client group has fallen by 23, from 71 to 48. This has coincided with a reduction of 314 places, from 975 to 661 and of 237 residents from 784 to 547.

7. Background Information on the Census of Care Home Establishments

The Scottish Care Home census is intended to cover all adult care home establishments that are registered with the Care Commission. The Care Commission is responsible for regulating a wide range of social services and was established under the Regulation of Care (Scotland) Act 2001.

This census was first issued in March 2003 and replaced two previous surveys. It combined the former 'Residential Care Home Census – R1' (run by the Scottish Government) and the 'Private Nursing Homes Census' (run by ISD Scotland). In March 2006 some of the data collection, relating mainly to care home places, was taken over by the Care Commission. Therefore, this publication excludes tables relating to places in single rooms, en-suite places and occupancy rates that have been published in statistics releases for previous censuses.

Figures showing the number and percentage of care home places in single rooms and the number and percentage of en-suite places in care homes are available from Audit Scotland. This data is shown as indicator 3 in the adult social work performance indicators at

Care should be taken when interpreting the Audit Scotland data. The local authority split shows places that are funded by each local authority as opposed to places located in each authority as is the case in this statistics release.

The number of Care Homes which were operational at the March census was 1426. Full or partial responses were received from 1276 open care homes giving a response rate of approximately 89.5 per cent.

The figures in this statistics release have been grossed up to take account of non-response. The methodology adopted was based on carrying forward previous records available for the care home in question.

All figures in this release omit care homes that deregistered to become Housing Support services.

In Section 2 Table 3, the March 2007 resident figure is taken from 2008 census. Some homes revise this figure which means it will not always agree with March 2007 resident figures previously published.

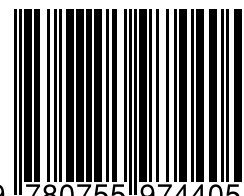
