#### THE MENTAL CAPACITY ACT

#### **Summary**

- The Mental Capacity Act 2005 came fully into force in October 2007. Resources were made available via the Area Based Grant <a href="http://www.dh.gov.uk/en/Publicationsandstatistics/Lettersandcirculars/Localauthoritysocialservicesletters/DH\_081123">http://www.dh.gov.uk/en/Publicationsandstatistics/Lettersandcirculars/Localauthoritysocialservicesletters/DH\_081123</a> to enable Councils with Social Services Responsibilities (CSSRs) to:
  - a) <u>train and raise awareness of staff</u> across their local implementation network of the implications of the Act, now including the Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards, and to act accordingly;
  - b) <u>commission</u> an Independent Mental Capacity Advocate (IMCA) service
  - c) <u>increase the staff time</u> needed for assessments of capacity and best interests decisions.
  - d) <u>deliver</u> the Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2009
- 2. The feedback from the first year of the Act's implementation was that the Act still required a large cultural shift in working with people who may lack capacity. As this requires time and resources the Department made additional funding available, over three years from 2008 -11, through the Area Based Grant (ABG) to support local

authorities to meet their statutory responsibilities. Area Based Grant is a non-ring fenced general grant. It is for local authorities and local implementation networks to choose the most effective ways of ensuring that all staff are aware of the requirements of the Act. This Local Authority Circular confirms the funding available for the year 2009-10.

#### The Mental Capacity Act

- 3. The Mental Capacity Act 2005, which received Royal Assent in April 2005, was fully implemented in October 2007. Councils with Social Service Responsibilities have set up local implementation networks to support the implementation of the Act. There are four key areas of the MCA which must be addressed.
  - I) The Duty To Instruct Independent Advocates
- 4. Statistical information continues to suggest that fewer people than expected have received the IMCA safeguard. Local authorities and NHS bodies have an ongoing need to ensure that all their affected staff are sufficiently trained; have local procedures and understand these procedures for instructing IMCAs and are held accountable if they do not.
- 5. The Mental Capacity Act created a new statutory service, the Independent Mental Capacity Advocate (IMCA) service. Its purpose is to help vulnerable people who lack capacity who are facing important decisions made by the NHS and Local Authorities about serious medical treatment and changes of accommodation, for example, moving to a hospital or care home. NHS bodies and Local Authorities have a duty, under the Act, to instruct and consult the IMCA in such decisions where the person lacking the capacity to consent has no family or friends supporting them. They may instruct an IMCA in relation to reviews of accommodation or in safeguarding/adult protection cases even if the person lacking capacity, in the latter case, has family or friends.
- 6. From 1<sup>st</sup> April 2009 IMCAs have additional duties and responsibilities arisisng from the Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards and services need to be in place whether as a result of extensions of existing contracts or other procurement means to deliver an extended IMCA service.
  - II) The Duty to Carry out Assessments of Capacity by using the Test outlined in the Act and described more fully in the Code of Practice.
- 7. The Act introduced clear requirements for the assessment of capacity. Assessments of capacity must now be undertaken by everyone; must follow the two stage test outlined in the Act and in the Code and must be specific to the decision that needs to be taken. This means home

- care workers, day centre staff, care managers, social workers, nurses and not just psychiatrists need to be able to make assessments of capacity and to record them to ensure there is a complete and accurate record of decisions and reasons for decisions.
- 8. Local authorities who have yet to do so will need to develop assement of capacity procedures and monitor audit their staff's practice through supervision, quality and compliance audits.
  - III) The Duty to carry out and to record Best Interests Decisions
- 9. The Act made Best Interests Decisions statutory. The Act and the Code outline how Best Interests Decisions should take place, and include for example that there is a duty to 'do whatever is possible' to permit and encourage people to take part in decision making. It includes the requirement to try and find out the views of the person who lacks capacity are, for example, finding out about their past wishes and feelings, their beliefs and their values. It is a requirement that officers do not make assumptions about someone's best interests simply on the basis of someone's condition or behaviour. The Code spells out that not only should the Best Interests Decision be recorded, but the process of working out what is in someone's best interests should also be recorded, how the decision was reached and the factors considered in reaching that decision.
- This is a requirement of the Act and must become the normal practice for decision making with all people who cannot make decisions for themselves. Local authorities who have yet to develop procedures for engaging particularly with people with dementia and learning disabilities in decision making will need to do so and should carry out audits of how frequently and how comprehensively these decisions have been made and recorded.

# Resources for training and awareness raising

- 11. There may be a continuing need to provide training and awareness raising either for existing staff or new staff joining services since the Act's full implementation. - 12. When calculating the resources for the MCA implementation, in 2006 and again in 2008, the Department considered that awareness raising and training should be made available to the whole local health and social care economy through the local implementation networks. This includes relevant staff in social services, housing and other local authority departments, NHS staff in the local area, independent and voluntary sector health and social care providers. Those providing

training should emphasise the duties (on local authorities and partners), to refer to IMCAs, and address consent and capacity assessments and record best interests decisions as spelt out in the Code. Local authorities can choose how to carry out this responsibility, but cannot choose not to involve the partner organisations.

## Resources for Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards

13. The Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards will be introduced on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2009. There is a comprehensive set of information to support implementation at:

14. The Department has allocated funding to local authorities for 2009 /10 to deliver the Safeguards in their areas. The additional funding is at an average of £600 per assessment of their share of 21.000 assessments that the Government has estimated will be carried out in England and Wales in the first year of the Safeguards.

- 16. In 2009 / 10 local authorities will receive £30.09M and the provisional allocation for 2010/11 is £28.926M. These address the additional costs of carrying out the Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards assessments, continuing training and awareness raising and increased time in relation to the Mental Capacity Act and commissioning of IMCA services. As in 2008/09 it will be for local authorities to determine their expenditure in relation to the audits of progress on MCA implementation. Annex A lists those allocations.
