# PRE-SCHOOL AND CHILDCARE WORKFORCE STATISTICS 2009

28 October 2009

Scotland's Chief Statistician today published <u>Pre-school and Childcare Workforce</u> <u>Statistics 2009</u>, which presents new statistics on childcare centres registered with the Care Commission, and childcare centre staff.

The main findings are:

# The Childcare Workforce (Tables 1-5)

- The number of managers of Day-care and Pre-school education centres, together with the number of paid staff working directly with children in 2009 was 29,670. This figure is not directly comparable with 2008 (see background note 8).
- Fourteen per cent of the childcare workforce were managers (Table 1).
- Ninety six per cent of the childcare workforce in 2009 were female (Table 1), which was no change from 2008.
- Eighty four per cent of the childcare workforce had a childcare qualification, an increase of one percentage point on 2008. Similarly, the percentage of staff with a childcare qualification at SVQ level 2 or above increased by two percentage points to 82 per cent, and the percentage with a childcare qualification at SVQ level 3 or above increased by three percentage points to 73 per cent (Table 2, Table 3).
- Childcare staff working in public sector centres were more qualified than those in the private or voluntary sectors. Eighty eight per cent of staff in public centres had childcare qualifications at SVQ level 3 or above, compared to 68 per cent in private and 57 per cent in voluntary centres (Table 4).
- Sixty Four per cent of childcare staff who were managers had a qualification at SVQ level 4 or above (Table 4).

 1,190 staff of all levels were working towards a qualification at SVQ level 4 or equivalent. 940 staff of all levels were working towards a degree level qualification (or equivalent) (Table 5). This compares to 1,320 staff of all levels working towards a SVQ level 4 or equivalent qualification, and 570 staff working towards a degree or equivalent level qualification in 2008.

## **BACKGROUND NOTES**

- 1 January 2009 figures for workforce qualifications are not directly comparable to previous years due to a correction in the method used to determine whether a member of staff had no qualifications or whether this was actually unknown. This revision affects figures on the qualifications of staff, and ensures that where a survey was returned with no information on qualifications that this was recorded as 'unknown' and not 'none'.
- 2 This publication provides information about the pre-school and childcare workforce (excluding childminders). The methodology is mostly the same as that used in 2008, and the figures are generally comparable with those years, with exceptions outlined in the footnotes.

- 4 Census week was the week beginning 26 January 2009.
- 5 The response rate to the Pre-School and Childcare Census was 81 per cent. An additional ninety six centres responded to say they had closed or were not currently operating. The 709 centres that did not respond were sent a letter to ask them a selection of the questions on pre-school education from the main census form. Of these, 355 responded.
- 6 The Pre-school and Childcare Workforce Qualifications Survey was combined with the Pre-School and Childcare Census. Around a quarter (1,009) of the centres contacted for the census were sampled and asked to distribute survey forms to every member of their staff who worked directly with children and/or who managed a Care Commission registered service. The sample was stratified by management sector and main service type, excluding public and private playgroups and private family centres (as there are very small numbers of these) and any unknowns. 774 centres returned at least one survey form (77 per cent), with 4,385 individual responses. Responses were weighted by sampling probability estimated from the census return and grossed up to 29,670, the total number of paid childcare staff in centres that were not excluded plus the number of management staff for centres that returned more forms than childcare staff.
- 7 When necessary, information used in January 2008 has been used to impute for those centres that did not return forms or did not complete specific questions.
- 8 In 2009 the workforce survey asked whether a member of staff was the manager of a Care Commission registered service. This question is different to 2008, where the survey asked whether a member of staff was responsible for managing the work of other staff. Therefore figures on management responsibility for 2009 cannot be compared with figures from previous years.

9 The figures in Tables 2 to 5 show the numbers of childcare staff with qualifications at the level equivalent to the SVQs shown below.

<u>Degree</u> Bachelors or Masters degree not directly relevant to childcare 10 Definitions of the services provided:

<u>Nursery:</u> This category includes daycare and pre-school centres for children aged 5 or under including local authority pre-school classes and nurseries; private and voluntary daycare nurseries including centres providing pre-school education in partnership with the local authority; and community and workplace nurseries. The services will normally be used by parents on a regular rather than a drop-in basis and be provided for at least the school term.

<u>Playgroup:</u> These provide sessional or day care for children aged 5 or under. Most are run by groups of parents with parent-led committees, although some may be owned by individuals or organised by other voluntary bodies or by the local authority. They rely heavily on parents/carers who volunteer their services although they may employ paid staff, e.g. a play leader or assistant. Some playgroups will provide pre-school education in partnership with the local authority. Staff working in public and private playgroups have been excluded from this publication.

<u>Out of school club:</u> Out of school clubs offer care for school age children in the absence of parents or carers from the end of the school day until parents can collect their children, and also before school starts.

<u>Breakfast club:</u> This is a specifically designated breakfast club that is likely to provide a meal and will take place before school hours.

<u>Other:</u> Includes Crèche, Children/ family centre, Sitter service, Holiday play scheme and Other. These are defined below:

<u>Crèche:</u> A crèche provides 'drop in' care for children in order to enable adults to engage in activities such as further education, shopping or attending a meeting.

<u>Children/family centre:</u> Child and family centres provide services similar to those available in community nurseries and nursery centres. Day care/education is provided along with a range of support services for families which can be adapted to meet local needs. They are usually managed by voluntary organisations or by the local authority's social work or education department. Staff from private family centres have been excluded from this publication.

<u>Sitter service</u>: A sitter service provides childcare in the family's own home from early morning until late evening seven days a week.

<u>Holiday play scheme:</u> Holiday play schemes cater mainly for school age children and provide opportunities for children to participate in a broad range of supervised leisure and educational activities during school holidays.

<u>Other:</u> Includes all other main services and where a centre has no single main service.
