

# UNCLE

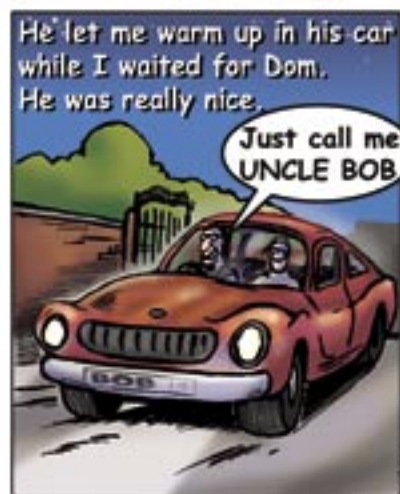
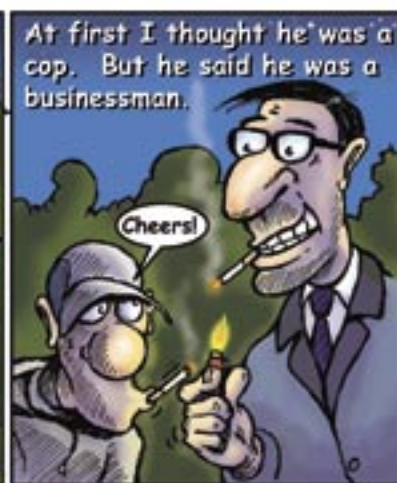
# BOB

...and then share you among their mates.

Then they get bored and find another kid.



Look, if you are going to hang around with 'Uncle Bob' and his mates, you need to learn about condoms, safer sex and keeping yourself out of **DANGER**.



If you want to get away from Uncle Bob and get some help, you have to **tell somebody**. Someone in your family, a social worker, teacher, an adult you trust.



Trust me, you won't get into trouble. You are the victim. You haven't done anything wrong. 'Uncle Bob' has!



## There are adults who are on the look out for young people just like you:

- ✗ they will often try to make friends with you and may seem really nice and kind;
- ✗ they may buy you presents or give you food, drink or drugs. They might let you stay at their home;
- ✗ they will want something in return.

## They might want to use you for sexual acts to please themselves or their friends:

- ✗ they can be very persuasive. Things can easily get out of your control;
- ✗ they might threaten you or tell you that you will get into trouble if you tell anybody. They might tell you that nobody will believe you;
- ✗ you might feel ashamed or embarrassed about telling somebody;
- ✗ you might be worried that you will get into trouble if anybody finds out.

## If you do find yourself in a situation like this:

- ✓ tell an adult who you trust about it (someone in your family, a social worker, school teacher etc): If you are not sure about who to trust, ring one of the telephone numbers on the back of this leaflet:
- ✓ there are people who can help you make sense of what has happened to you
- ✓ you won't get into trouble
- ✓ you are the victim
- ✓ you have not committed a crime
- ✓ you will be believed and listened to
- ✓ you will not be judged
- ✓ you will be safe from harm.
